Unusually Good Results Attained by Vegetable and Fruit Growers—Threshing Is Started.

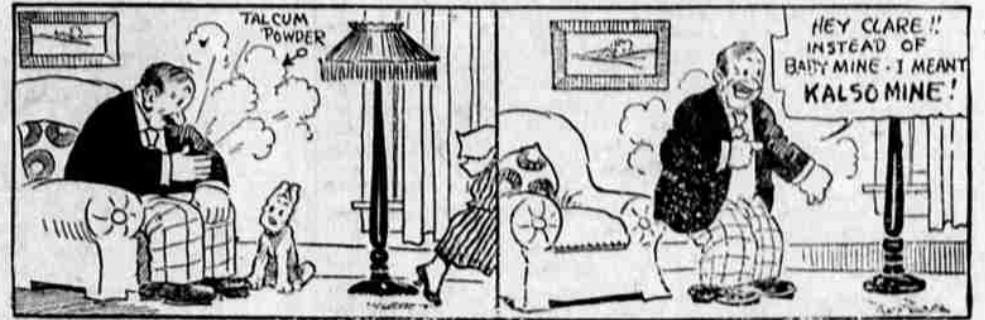
