Plan for Using Steel from Deschutes Valley Road Feasible, Says Sage of Harney County.

That there is hope for the plan of taking up the steel on the O.-W. R. & N. line up the Deschutes canyon, and laying the rails down to connect Bend with Burns, was the intimation given this morning by William Hanley, wealthy Harney county rancher, in speaking of his recent trip to Washington, D. C., where he laid this matter before the railroad administration. "It can be done," was Mr. Hanley's declaration, although he had no definite information as to the time when such a policy might be carried out.

Mr. Hanley is anxious also for better roads between Bend and Burns, and stated this morning that in the near future he might send his big caterpillar tractor, pulling two blades, to grade between the two cities.


