Lad Who Enlisted When Only 15 Years of Age Is Decorated for Valor by French.

[By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.] SEATTLE, Oct. 1.—Lincoln high school of Seattle is particularly proud of one of its students, Henry M. O'Brien.

The reason is that Henry, before he was 15 years old, had been through five of the fiercest engagements of the world war, as runner, one of the most hazardous of all duties.

The uniform, which young O'Brien recently carefully discarded, was adorned with the croix de guerre, with star, the second highest award for valor which was bestowed by France.

O'Brien, when only 15, joined the army by telling a few white lies, and making the recruiting officers think he was 18.

Asked why he was given the croix de guerre, the high school boy modestly said: "I don't know why the cross of war was given me, but somehow they cited me. I was just a runner carrying messages and doing reconnoitering."
