### SPECULATE IN FOREIGN MONEY

(Continued from Page 1.)

Speculating on the mark is considered purely a gamble, but usually a good one, since the exchange depends largely on trade and it is thought trade will begin gradually. It is thought by many that the mark should rise to ten cents in value inside two years, enabling trebling of money invested. However, conservatives point at the Russian ruble, in which many people invested, and which is now down to practically nothing in value. Many people who invested in marks last spring when they were around eight cents, are rueing the drop of three cents.

The system of buying most in vogue is to purchase exchange in Berlin banks. The receipt can either be

kept here, and sold later, or can be sent to Berlin, where the marks can be on deposit at interest. It is said the Germans are not averse to the enormous buying of marks even at such low prices, since it will enable them to secure raw materials on the dollars they thus secure in American exchange, and will stimulate trade. Furthermore, demand for marks will send their value up.

There is a very general feeling, despite the low price of the mark, that the Germans will come back industrially very quickly, perhaps more so than the French and Italians due to the Teutonic mania for work. The only great danger, Bolshevism, is considered pretty well under control, especially since the new German Republic has at its disposal at least a million fighting men under the name of "Noske Guards."
