man that later develops into true love.

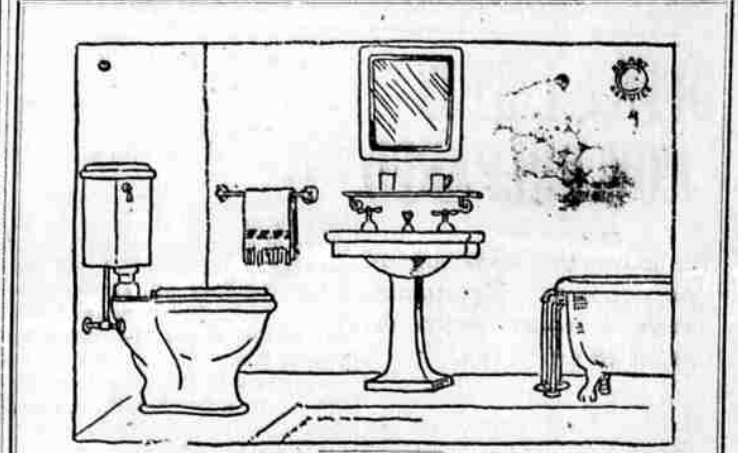
