to realize on them he obliged to place them as a lien against the irrigation system for which it is claimed the money was spent the District might face another problem.

Another important matter that will be taken care of by the contract if approved is the maintenance question. The Company, as everyone knows, has applied to the Public Service Commission for an increase of maintenance from 80c per acre and \$1.00 per acre to \$2.00 per acre. Should the Commission grant this increase the District will pay \$46,000, annually over and above the present fee. Of course, it will cost the District something to maintain and operate the system, but it will do it on a cost basis and all moneys collected from the farmers will go into actual maintenance and operation of system.

The Contract has been approved by the Land Board and is recommended by it as the best solution of the many problems and difficulties that have arisen since the beginning of the work on the project.

The worst thing, almost, that can befall a community where it depends upon irrigation is to get into litigation. It introduces the element of uncertainty and has a deterrent ef-

fect on every line of business. The approval of the Contract as recommended by the Directors of the District at the coming election is the simplest, most certain and least expensive way out of our difficulties.
