### Fifteen Years Ago

(From the columns of The Bulletin of December 30, 1904.)

That Bend believes in a good public school was shown last Wednesday night when at the school meeting called for that purpose, a 12 mill tax was voted. This will yield \$1,632, if nothing is allowed for delinquents.

Christmas exercises were held at the First Baptist church Saturday night for the children in town, and to cite the stability of Bend's population, it is estimated that there were not less than 450 present.

The Methodists in Bend have taken steps to organize a Sunday school and build a church edifice.

The Bend, Water, Light, & Power Co., which was incorporated a few weeks ago with a capital of \$10,000, perfected its organization this week by electing E. P. Batten, H. C. Ellis, and W. E. Guerin directors, and making Mr. Batten president and treasurer, and Mr. Ellis vice-president and secretary. The purpose of organizing at this time is to start work for a public water service in Bend.

A second story is to be built on the bank building immediately to furnish necessary office accommodations for the telephone company and other corporations now in the building.
