

TWO PER CENT OFFER IS NOT LIKED BY U. S.

WOULD RATHER WAIVE
CLAIM

PROMPT REPLY GIVEN

Share of German Shipping Not Satisfactory to Ambassador Wallace
—Work of Supreme Council Virtually Ended.

PARIS, Jan. 13.—The supreme council of the peace conference, today notified American Ambassador Wallace that its decision to award to the United States only two per cent of the German shipping to be distributed among the allies, and associated powers, is unchanged.

Ambassador Wallace immediately replied that the United States would prefer to waive its claim entirely.

The conference completed the Hungarian treaty with our modifications, and refused the Serbian request that the Croats be recognized as a separate entity within Hungary.

Following these actions the council virtually passed out of existence, deciding to refer all questions in the future to a committee of ambassadors. The council decided to publish the minutes of the peace conference.

TO DEMAND EXTRADITION.

PARIS, Jan. 13.—A demand upon Holland for the extradition of the former kaiser is imminent. Le Matin declared today. A list of 500 accused Germans, including the former crown prince, will be handed to Germany within a fortnight, the newspaper said, with demands that Germany deliver the accused to the allied military leaders in the Rhine provinces. It is understood that Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain has abandoned his policy for the expulsion of the Turkish sultan from Europe.

ATTORNEY BRAVES UNLUCKY NUMBER

Will Start Trip On Thirteenth,
Sleep in Berth 13, and Try Case
in Salem on Friday.

Braving a weird combination of thirteens and Fridays, J. H. Haner and R. S. Hamilton will leave tonight for Salem, where Mr. Haner's case against the city of Eugene, regarding improvement assessments, and involving approximately \$1,000, will be argued before the Supreme court by Mr. Hamilton.

To begin with, the trip starts on the thirteenth, and Mr. Hamilton has lower 13 as his berth number on the Pullman. The case will be heard on Friday of the present week. "There's bad luck in store for someone," Mr. Haner declared, "but whether it's for me or for the city of Eugene, I don't know."

TO TRY LAWYER FOR TALKING TOO MUCH

Attorney Charged With Conversing
With I. W. W. Prisoners at
Montesano Jail.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 13.—Charged with talking to his clients through the bars of the jail, George W. Vanderveer, attorney for alleged I. W. W., on trial here, is booked to have his own trial this afternoon.

The offense of which Vanderveer is alleged to be guilty, is a misdemeanor. His clients were charged with criminal syndicalism.

Vanderveer is attorney for William Haywood of Chicago, under sentence of 20 years for disloyalty, and is counsel for the 11 alleged I. W. W., who will be tried at Montesano, Washington, January 26, in connection with the murder of four members of the American Legion at Centralia Armistice Day.

ASKS WORK FOR EX-SERVICE MEN

TRAINING PROVIDED
FOR DISABLED

Replacement Officer Visits Bend to
Make Arrangements With Em-
ployers to Aid in Vocational
Education.

Kenneth L. Cooper, replacement officer from the district office of the Federal Board for vocational education, is in the city today looking up openings for the placing of disabled ex-service men in various industries where they may obtain additional training with a view to future steady employment. The range of these various vocations is wide and extends into the technical branches, such as foundry work, electric, steam, and gas engineering, auto mechanics, and even to such lines of endeavor as bookkeeping and accounting.

According to Mr. Cooper there are now several thousand men in the northwest who were disabled in overseas service, a large number of whom are taking advantage of the rehabilitation work being conducted by the federal government. The government is maintaining a large trained force of men to obtain all possible information regarding disabled soldiers, to determine their fitness for particular jobs for which they may have preference, and is paying a salary, the minimum of which is \$80, while they are learning trades.

By arrangement with employers, the man in training receives no pay from the employer owing to the fact that while learning this trade, the man takes up the time of paid employees.

R. G. White, formerly principal of the Bend high school, is associated in this work, and will be in Bend within a few days to look up further possibilities for placing these disabled ex-service men.

The first Bend concern to signify its willingness to take a man for training is the Bend Iron Works, which company will take an ex-soldier to learn pattern making.

While in the city, Mr. Cooper will confer with other large concerns.

MOUNTAINEERS DIE IN SNOW

AVALANCHES IN ALPS SMOTHER
VILLAGES — FEW ESCAPE
FROM SLIDES FOLLOWING
HEAVY STORMS.

ROME, Jan. 13.—Several villages in the Alpine regions have been wiped out by avalanches following severe snow storms, according to dispatches received here. In the province of Piedmont, along the Swiss frontier, an avalanche smothered the village of Demonte. Workers so far have recovered six bodies.

The villages of Vernante and Lione were also destroyed, but their populations, warned, fled before the avalanches struck.

The avalanche swept down the valley at night, burying a house in which seven were sleeping near Aosta.

CHAPTER SATISFIED WITH NURSE SYSTEM

During the three months' probation period during which the public health nurse system has been tried out by the Bend chapter of the Red Cross, it has proved its worth, and will be continued for a year. It was decided last night at a meeting of the executive board of the chapter with the committee in direct charge of this activity, headed by S. W. Moore, Miss Emma Grittenberger, of Seattle, supervisor of public health nursing in the northwest division, was in attendance at the meeting.

Miss Margaret Brems, the Red Cross nurse who has been here during the probation period was engaged to fill out the year ending October 1.

Afrique Victims Are Believed To Number Over 500

PARIS, Jan. 13.—Five hundred and eighty-nine are still missing following the wreck of the steamer, Afrique, which sank in the Bay of Biscay yesterday. They are believed to have perished.

COURT BACKS THE GOVERNOR

OLCOTT WILL STAY IN OFFICE
FOR FULL UNEXPIRED TERM
OF PREDECESSOR, IS OPINION
HANDLED DOWN.

SALEM, Jan. 13.—Governor Olcott will hold office for the full unexpired term of the late governor, the Supreme court decided today by a vote of four to three. Justice Johns wrote the predominating opinion, with McBride, Bean, and Bennett concurring, the last named writing a special concurring decision.

Harris dissented, with Benson and Burnett concurring with his opinion.

WAR WORKER IS TO GIVE ADDRESS HERE

Dr. Estella Ford Warner to Speak
Before Women's Civic League
Tomorrow.

Members of the Women's Civic League will meet at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the gymnasium to hear an address by Dr. Estella Ford Warner, returned from war work overseas. Dr. Warner, in her work in Europe had charge of the health and physical recreation of refugee girls in the war zones. Dr. Warner arrived in Bend this morning.

The meeting was formerly announced to be held today.

STATE AID IS PROPOSED FOR BEND TO KLAMATH RAILROAD

PORTLAND, Jan. 13.—A new plan in railroad building in Oregon will come into being should a bill now being drafted for presentation in the special legislative session, be passed by the Oregon lawmakers. State cooperation if not state aid for the Bend to Klamath Falls line, is provided in the contemplated measure, which would give the state highway commissioners power to construct a highway grade of sufficient width to permit of a standard railroad line being laid along one side without interfering with the use of the road by automobile or other traffic. Appointment by the governor of a non-salaried commission to make a full investigation of the practicability of laying a rail line from Bend to Klamath Falls, including the determination of construction and operating costs, would be authorized.

With this authority given to the state highway commission, and the machinery of the separate commission ready to operate, the main idea back of the proposal could be worked out, and if found feasible, put into effect.

The development of this idea includes the negotiation of an agreement between the state on the one hand and the O.-W. R. & N. and the Oregon Trunk. On the other, under which the rails now unused between the Columbia main line and Bend up the Deschutes canyon would be taken up and relied on the grade provided between Bend and Klamath Falls, the entire line when finally completed between Klamath Falls and the junction with the main line tracks at the Columbia to be under a common user between the two operating companies.

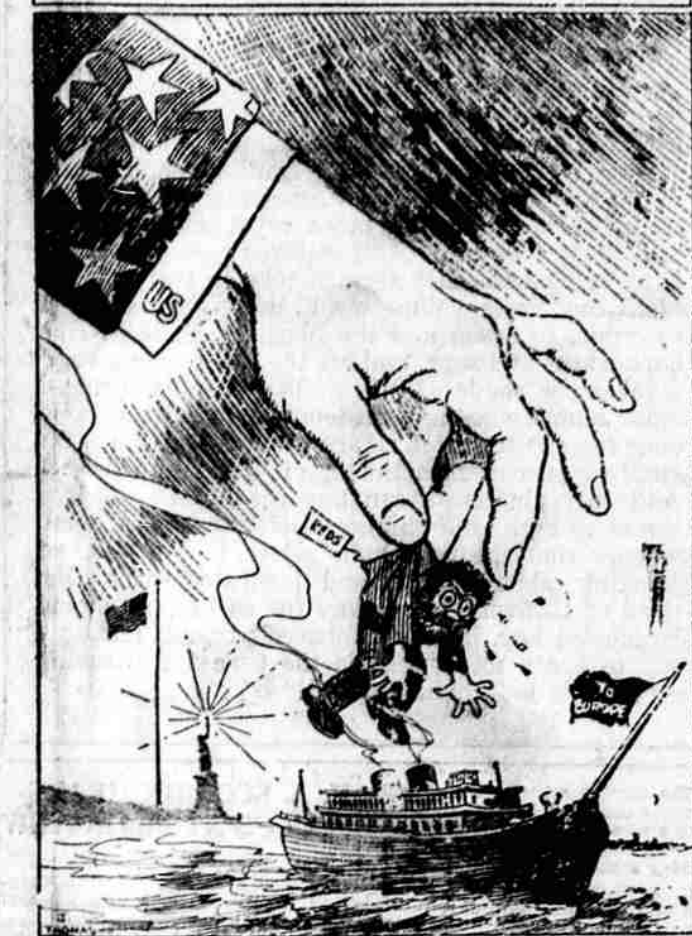
It is argued by those who are backing the plan that the cost to the state of widening the main highway between Bend and Klamath Falls, as the route has been located on the road map by the legislature, sufficiently to permit the construction of a rail line along one side would be relatively small. Practically the entire distance, it is pointed out, is a level table land which would require but few cuts or fills.

It is argued also, that the long reaches of non-productive territory between Klamath Falls and Bend make it likely, if not practically certain, that neither of the two railroad systems will extend their lines for some time to come. In the meantime, it is pointed out, the growing business of the Klamath county is being gobbled up by California notwithstanding the natural desire of the people of the district to effect business connections in their own state.

Fronting these conditions it is argued that the state could well afford to furnish the grade for the extension, particularly as it would at the same time be engaged in grading for the state highway, provided that an agreement could be reached with the railroads to join hands in laying the rails and operating trains were the grade to be furnished.

It is not contemplated by those back of the scheme that the state would part with title to the grade but that it would merely grant an easement over it, to be used under such terms and conditions and for such time as might be determined by agreement between the railroad companies and the state.

ACCIDENT FUND BILLS PASSED

COMPENSATION RAISED BY
BILLS WHICH WIN OUT IN
HOUSE — EARLY ADJOURN-
MENT IS FORECASTED.

SALEM, Jan. 13.—The house today unanimously passed the bill repealing the provisions of the industrial commission act requiring that \$400,000 be set aside from the industrial accident fund, empowering it to construct an industrial and reconstruction hospital.

The bill increasing the accident and sick benefit provisions of the industrial compensation law was unanimously adopted, and another measure bearing on the same general subject, creating a rehabilitation fund of \$400,000 from the industrial accident fund, was passed.

The senate passed a concurrent resolution calling for adjournment at noon Saturday. A similar resolution introduced Monday still awaits action in the house.

MEETING IS CALLED FOR DAIRY FARMERS

Stockholders of Creamery and All
Ranchers Interested Urged to
Be Present on January 24.

Following up the campaign made during the latter part of 1919 for the development of the dairy industry in Central Oregon, the directors of the Central Oregon Farmers' Creamery urge that all ranchers having milk stock or who contemplated the purchase of dairy animals, attend the meeting of the creamery association, to be held in the Deschutes County court room, at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, January 24.

The chief purpose of the meeting will be for the discussion of matters of benefit to a farmers' organization of the kind, and special topics of interest to the dairy farmer, including the subject of dairy marketing, will be developed. An address will be given by R. A. Ward on the subject of cooperative creameries.

COAL OPERATORS AGREE TO AWARDS

ARMY MEDALS MADE TARGET IN THE HOUSE

WON AT DESKS, SAYS
REPRESENTATIVE

PERSHING ATTACKED

Gallivan Criticizes Chief of Staff
March, Declaring General Hasn't
Room Between Belt and Collar
For Decorations.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 13.—Charges that army medals for distinguished service were awarded unfairly, were made today by Representative Gallivan in urging a complete investigation by the House military affairs committee.

Many army officers who never fired a shot were given medals, and scores of heroes in the A. E. F. were not rewarded, Representative Gallivan claimed, adding that as a result of this, a distinguished service medal is now known as a "desk service medal."

The representative was bitter in his denunciation of Chief of Staff March, claiming that "he hasn't enough space between his belt and his collar to display the medals he has received, although he did not hear a hostile shot throughout the entire war."

General Pershing was attacked as having given a medal to "every commissioned messenger boy."

BEND-MADRAS GAME IS SET FOR FRIDAY

Personnel of Teams Differs Little
From Last Year—Hard Contest
Is Expected.

With practically the same team as that which played during last year's season, the Bend high school will begin its basketball schedule this year when the game with the Madras high school quintet is staged at the Bend gymnasium Friday night. The ball will be put in play at 8:15 o'clock. As the players line up two days before the contest, the game will probably start with Brostehous at center, L. Coyner and Sanders in the forward positions, and Helfrich and Dutt as guards. In case the injured knee which Sanders sustained in the first football game this fall prevents his playing through both halves, Dutt will go in as center, and Brostehous will take a forward's job.

The Madras team, generally considered as the strongest in Central Oregon last year, is captained by John Young, and has virtually the same personnel as in 1919. Coach Moore, of the Bend five, expects a hard fight.
