#### OUR VIRTUOUS FRIEND.

We note in a local newspaper the statement that the official county paper, which is the weekly edition of The Bulletin, receives \$30 per month for publishing the proceedings of the county court. Since this is not so and in view of the purpose apparently actuating the statement, we were at first inclined to call it a lie. Possibly, however, there was no intent to deceive in respect to the matter of compensation and so we are willing to let it go as one of the inaccuracies or misstatements which characterize the newspaper in question whenever it attempts to deal with matters of fact.

In view of the pose assumed by our newspaper friend, who virtuously asserts that it makes no charge for publishing the court proceedings, it might be proper to inquire why it charges the city more than the law allows for the publication of street notices.
