THE OREGONIAN AND HOOVER

Since making our few remarks about Herbert Hoover yesterday our attention has been called to the attitude taken by the esteemed Oregonian concerning this new presidential possibility. The Oregonian has taken considerable interest in the suggestion that Mr. Hoover be made the Democratic candidate for president, and so well as we can gather its thought, fears him. Apparently our large Portland friend thinks Mr. Hoover a remarkably able man but dislikes extremely the thought that he may become the democratic candidate. So at least, do we read its praise of the man and its knife in the back after the effort has been made by praise to lower the reader's guard.

Surely anyone who favors another for president, may fear Mr. Hoover. And if one's hopes are that the democratic party be unsuccessful he may well hope that anyone but Hoover will be the candidate. Fearing Hoover he may seek to criticize him but readers of the Oregonian will not be deceived by such remarks as the paper made on Saturday as to Hoover's having "joined his forces with the democratic national administration," referring clearly to his work as food administrator.

Having asserted that Hoover was at one time a republican the Oregonian seems to be trying to show that he is not a proper candidate for the democratic party to nominate. That, we suggest, is something for the democratic convention to determine. For all we know he may be a republican. But it is clear he is not a politician and he has never "joined his forces with the democratic national administration," in any political sense, as suggested by the Oregonian.

He was food administrator during the war. John Pershing, a republican, commanded the American armies. The Oregonian, a republican newspaper, served the nation during the war. May it be said that Pershing and the Oregonian "joined forces with the democratic national administration" in any political way? Hardly. Nor did Mr. Hoover.

The foregoing is not that we care whether he did or not but because we dislike so to see the Oregonian so unfairly write of a man and seek to make capital against him by asserting something that is not so.
