THE CITY STREETS.

Bend is divided these days into two opposing road camps—the pavers and the anti-pavers. Between the two our city streets are dropping into a condition of increasing roughness. Chuck holes abound. Thank-you-marms are everywhere. It is a real liver tonic to ride the length of Wall street.

The trouble comes from the fact that the paving camp is unwilling to see any money spent on the streets in an effort to put them in usable shape now. They argue that the streets should be paved and that money spent for any other purpose will be wasted.

The anti-pavers, on the other hand, urge that the streets be repaired for this year, at least, and the business of paving postponed in the hope that another year it will be less expensive.

At the last council meeting Mayor Eastes suggested that something should be done to put the down town streets in repair. The suggestion was not made in opposition to paving but simply from the view-point of one interested to see existing conditions remedied. Councilman McPherson objected to doing anything in the way of repairs, which he said would be only temporary, because it would be merely throwing money away.

As a result nothing is being done and the ruts are getting deeper and the holes bigger round.

There is powerful opposition to paving. It may not come this year. Even if it is to come it will be weeks, if not months, before the work will be begun. In the meantime what is to be done? If a decision will not be made for some time and then should be against paving it will be too late to make even repairs under favorable conditions.

If the streets are to be paved let's get the plan accepted at once. If not, let's proceed at once to the work that must be done to put our main streets in shape for the coming season.

One of the things that might have been done some days ago, and that may still be done though with less success, is to drag the streets. In the past few days The Shevlin-Hixon Company has dragged the road leading to its mill, changing it almost over night from a quagmire of mud to a smooth and level highway. This company sets the example every year. Some day the city will follow it, get out a drag while the roads are still wet and save some money and lots of cussing.

WANT WATER FOR PLAINVIEW LAND

Filing on Tributary of Sparks Lake Is Made—Storage of 80,000 Acre Feet Contemplated.

SALEM, Jan. 29.—For the irrigation of the lands under the Plainview irrigation system near Gist, Oregon, the Plainview Irrigation Co. has filed an application with the state engineer covering appropriation of water from a tributary of Sparks Lake.

J. P. Newell of Portland asks permission to construct a reservoir for the storage of 80,000 acre feet of the waters of Big Marsh creek, a tributary of the Deschutes river, for the irrigation of lands near La Pine.

Bend to Klamath, on a grade also to be used for a state highway. Mr. Gray first smiled, then laughed, declaring the scheme to be utterly impracticable. Mention of the failure of the branch line to pay dividends drew a doleful admission, but no indication as to how these conditions might be overcome.

Development Noted.

Immediately on arriving in Bend, the official party visited the big pine mills at the south end of the city, were taken for a tour of Bend, visiting the gymnasium, the Emblem club, and inspecting the Pilot Butte Inn, and later meeting informally with J. A. Eastes, chairman of the special reception committee, and other members of the commercial club.

All were pleased with the apparent prosperity of Bend, and Mr. Gray, who had visited Central Oregon several years ago and had seen no promise for Bend at that time, was especially surprised at the progress made here.
