"LINCOLNIZATION" CONFERENCE OPENS

Ways and Means of Combating Bolshevism and Kindred Evils Discussed at Meeting.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin) CLEVELAND, Ohio, Feb. 12.—Ways and means of combating bolshevism, the promotion of more cordial relations between labor and capital and the problems of the workers, were subjects discussed here today by a conference of 500 leading educators, ministers, senators, congressmen and others in public life, including candidates for office.

General Leonard Wood, candidate for the Republican nomination for president was to be the guest of honor at a banquet this evening.

Dr. John Wesley Hill, chancellor of the Lincoln Memorial University, said invitations had been extended to men from all walks of life and from all parts of the country. As this is Lincoln's birthday, Dr. Wesley said, the slogan of the conference is to "Lincolnize America."

Aside from congressmen, senators, governors and others high in the political life of the country, the invitation list held the following names: Marcus M. Marks, specialist in industrial science, New York; Professor W. B. Guthrie, professor of economics, College of the City of New York; W. C. Fittz, recently first assistant attorney general of the United States; Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers; Dr. Donde Palen, editor of the Catholic Encyclopedia; F. A. Steberling, president of the Goodyear Tire & Rubber company and M. W. Harrison, director of the New York Bankers' Association.

M'CLELLAN HEARING SET FOR TOMORROW

Hearing in the east of T. J. McClellan, of Bend, charged with beating his son-in-law, Mike Merg, with an automatic pistol, will be held in Justice court at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, Judge J. A. Eastes announced this morning. McClellan was in custody yesterday afternoon, and is now out on \$300 cash bail.

Originally "Easterling." Sterling, in such applications as sterling silver, has a curious history. The people, especially merchants, from Germany, were called Easterlings, because the country lay east of England. About the time of King Richard, money coined in Germany came into great demand in England. Men skilled in minting were imported into England, and the coins they produced were called easterlings, after the name of imported workmen. "By the tendency of abridgment that seems inherent in all languages, the first part of the word was dropped, and the word became sterling.
