

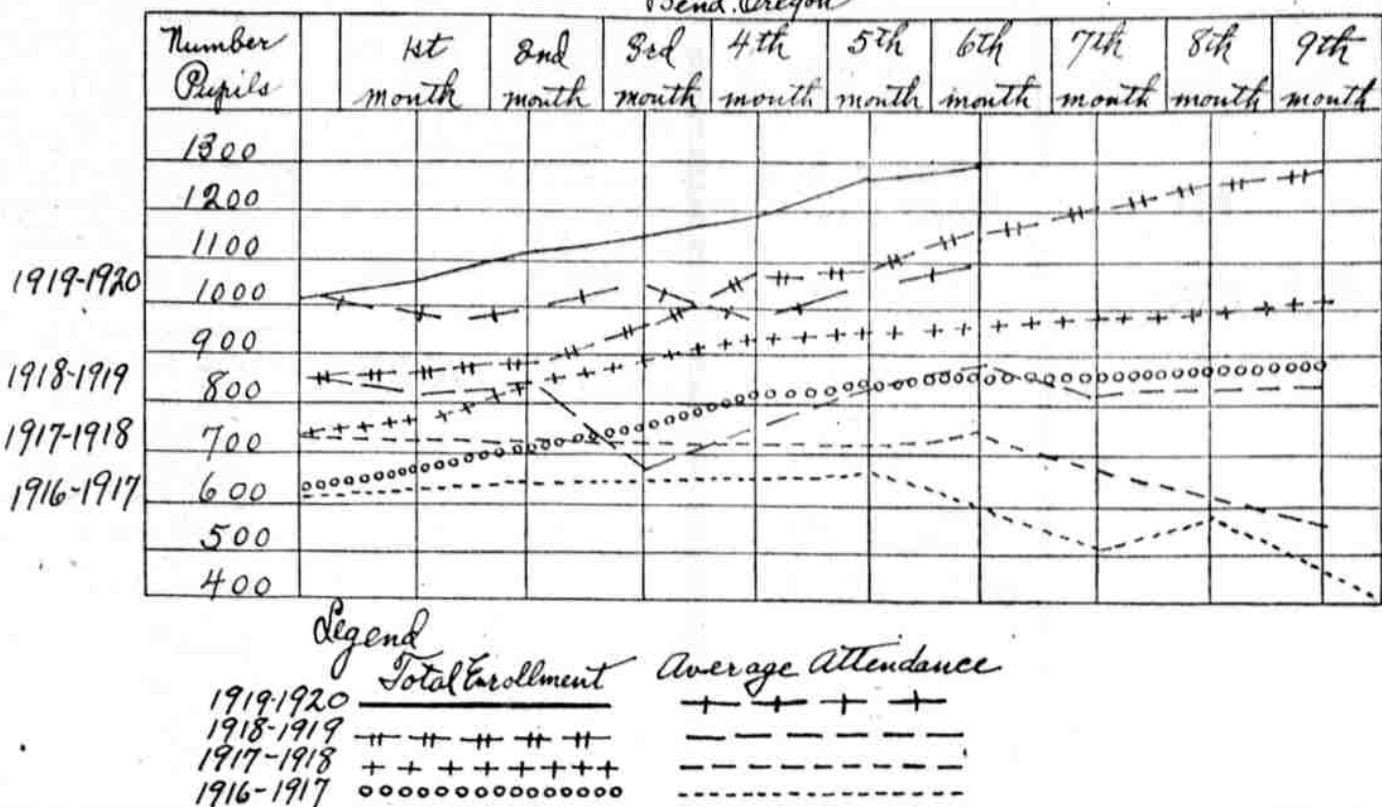

PORTLAND EDUCATOR WILL OPEN SCHOOL

Branch of Pacific Extension Institute to Be Established by W. W. Williams.

Taking offices in the O'Donnell Building over the post office, Prof. W. W. Williams of Portland is opening today a branch of the Pacific Extension Institute, introducing the Williams system in shorthand. Prof. Williams was in Bend during the winter when he made a survey of conditions about the city and upon his return to Portland conferred with other officers of the institute later deciding to open the first branch in Bend.

Prof. Williams is a graduate of Lawrence University of Appleton, Wisconsin and took post graduate work at the University of Wisconsin where he obtained his master's degree. "I have come here," said Prof. Williams, this morning, because I believe that this is an ideal city for the opening of a branch of the Pacific Extension Institute. I am the author of the Williams System and know the possibilities it offers to students. Having studied all the other shorthand systems I am thoroughly acquainted with them and know their

WAR MORTALITY RATE WAS UNUSUALLY LOW

At a recent meeting of the sales force of Oregon Life Insurance Company in Portland, Oregon, President A. L.
