HAS \$300 MORTGAGE ON IMPERIAL LOTS

Easterner Writes to Ascertain Development of Townsite Marketed in Boom Days.

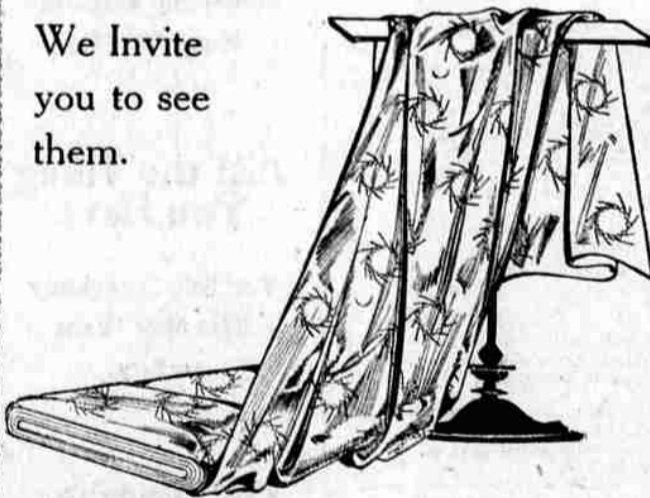

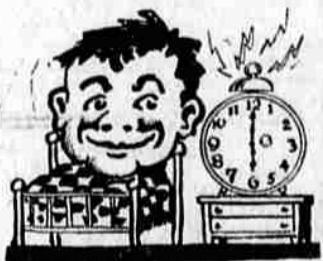
