For Six Months of the Year Flowers Bloom in Profusion in Otherwise Desolate Country.

Amidst the filth, squalor and pover ty of Siberia it is good to find something which seems devoid of all these. and which speaks to this desolate country of a better day, 'After months of snow and ice, and within a week from the time the snow has disappeared, spring begins, and with it come the flowers. Spring and summer and autumn are all one in Siberia—there is no time for them all; a brief six months is the most which nature allows, and so they have to cram into that space everything they can, the Christian Science Monitor says,

The chief flowers are anemone trises and lilies-of-the-valley. All of them, especially the latter, grow wild in great profusion, and the whole world seems to smell of lilies for a brief two or three weeks.
