Big Saving Effected.

"The use of the silo is the reproduction of green pasture under cover," Mr. Westover said, "It means a reduction of from 25 to 30 per cent in the cost of raising beef, and cuts the cost of butter fut to nine cents

Mr. Westover spoke highly of the mflower as a substitute for eorn for ensilage, and declared that the plant is specially adapted to climatic and soil conditions in Central Oregon. The alfalfa grown in Central Oregon, he said, is the best in the United States, containing more nourishment, and producing a heavier stand than in other localities.

Costs Are Discussed.

In response to questions, he stated that the silo can be used to best advantage on ranches where 10 or more head of cattle are kept. Asked as to the best type of silo, he said that approximately 500 different kinds are on the market, and that the silo put out by the Miller Lumber Co., of Bend, is as good as any of them. The pine lumber produced here, he mentioned, is particularly adapted to this
