BEND BETTER THAN REDMOND FOR THE FAIR

has outgrown the Redmond style of fair. "Why go to a hamlet when you can go to a city?" he asked.

That Bend is noted for its bootleggers and gamblers was the declaration of Miss Doty, second speaker for the affirmative. She affirmed that the county seat of Deschutes county is not a fit place morally for a fair, and that Bend is not willing to put the question up to the farmers.

Bend is more able financially to stage a county exposition, and has \$20,000 subscribed for this purpose against Redmond's \$8,000. Miss Kappahn, second speaker for the affirmative, maintained. The fair would get more paid admissions in Bend, as over half the people in the county are in that city, and consequently more substantial premiums

could be offered to bring in outside exhibitors, she said. She cited also Bend's facilities for amusement and accommodation of crowds. "A bigger, better fair at Bend, is a benefit to the entire county, and consequently a greater benefit to Cloverdale than a smaller, inferior fair at Redmond would be," she concluded.

Mr. Kline and Miss Miller appeared in rebuttal.

Preceding the debate, Mr. Kline and R. A. Ward of Bend, and Fred N. Wallace, of Tumalo, spoke on the road situation and the program outlined at the recent county meeting under the auspices of the Bend Commercial club. Announcement was made of a rabbit drive which will be held beginning at 10 o'clock next Sunday, starting from the Plainview school.

R. A. Ward announced a moving

picture show to be given in Bend on the evening of April 15, at the Grand theatre, in which films furnished by O. M. Plummer, of the Pacific International Livestock exposition, showing famous blooded cattle, and approved methods of handling livestock, will be thrown on the screen. All farmers and their families in Deschutes county are invited, and seating accommodations for residents of the county outside of Bend will be provided before citizens of the county seat are taken care of.
