STREETS TOPIC IN CITY STUDY

Streets, housing conditions, and legal standards, are covered in the questions asked in the final installment of the Red Cross chapter course questionnaire. These queries are as follows:

- What type of surfacing is used for the streets? For the alleys?
- For roads? How are these kept? Are the streets and alleys swept with dry sweeps or wet?
- Does the city take care of garbage, refuse and manure? What methods are used for each? If not, what does the law require citizens to do in taking care of these things? To what extent is the law complied with generally?
- What does the state law require concerning inspection of milk? Of meat? Of other foods? What do the city ordinances require in the case of each? Is the law complied with? Are the materials inspected?
- Are dairies inspected? How many inspectors in the community? What training has the inspector? Are bakeries inspected? What other plants? Are dairies used for private parties inspected? Is there inspection of milkers, bakers, etc.? Is the law complied with?
- What are the regulations concerning disinfection? Are they enforced? What types of disinfection are used? What general types of houses prevail in the district?
- Are fire-proof roofings required? Other fire-proof materials?
- What is the material most commonly used?
- Are the majority of houses lighted by lamps? By gas? In what proportion of homes is electricity used?
- What are the housing laws concerning fire-protection? Concern-

ing plumbing? To what extent are these fulfilled? How many inspectors are there in the city?

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Referred to the people by the Legislative Assembly
LIMITATION OF FOUR PER CENT STATE INDEBTEDNESS FOR PERMANENT ROADS.—Purpose: To amend Section 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon so as to permit the creation of debts and liabilities including previous debts and liabilities for the purpose of building and maintaining permanent roads to the amount of four per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property in the State of Oregon, instead of two per cent as now provided by law.

**NO PROPERTY TAX—NO DIRECT TAX
NO INCREASE IN AUTO LICENSE FEES
NO INCREASE OF GASOLINE TAX**

Keep these three facts in mind. The present auto license fees and gasoline tax will pay both the principal and interest on all the bonds under this amendment, and will yield an annual surplus besides for other state highway work. No additional taxation of any kind.

FEDERAL FUNDS MUST BE MATCHED

Oregon must have sufficient Highway Funds to match Federal apportionments or Oregon cannot get the benefit of Federal money for Oregon Roads. Increasing this constitutional limit is a necessity. Unless limit is increased, either state roads cannot be completed for many, many years, or must be finished by direct property taxation. This measure averts direct property tax for state highways and makes early completion possible. Let's get the roads built now.

Income from Present Sources Sufficient to Pay Principal and Interest.

The fact that revenue from auto license fees and gasoline tax, without increase of present rates, will be ample to pay both principal and interest on these bonds, is clearly set forth in official figures in the State Pamphlet, mailed to every registered voter.
