**BEND WINNER FROM MAUPIN**

HIT AND ERROR TOTAL IS UNUSUAL

Clifford's Men Score in All Excepting One Inning—Three Maupin Slabsters Seek in Vale To Cut Off the Runs.

In a game in which both sides clouted the ball freely, in which no less than five pitchers worked, and with the errors of the visiting team rather abundant, Bend won yesterday from Maupin on a score of 15 to 5. A good crowd saw the contest, which was played in the first real baseball weather Bend has enjoyed.

Clifford's men started the scoring in the first inning and kept it up through the remainder of the game. In the second half of the first De Armond tripled and scored when the shortstop juggled De Lashmutt's grounder. De Lashmutt continued to second. Hyberg filed out to second and De Lashmutt went out at third on Clifford's grounder, pitcher's assist. Foley reached first on second's error, advancing Clifford, who scored on Dickens' long single. For Maupin, Confer, Miller and Chastain got on bases in the order named. Confer was caught on second and the other two died when A. Morris filed out to Clifford and Rennie went out at first on Hyberg's assist.

**Errors Are Numerous.**  
 In the second., Hall filed out. Springer followed by the bean ball. De Armond walked. De Lashmutt reached first on a fielder's error and Springer scored when Bonney played tag with Hyberg's grounder. Clifford's neat sacrifice down the third base line brought in De Armond and signaled the installation of a new slabster, Bonney taking the job vacated by Glen Morris. Maupin again failed to score in the second and Glen Morris, the only man to reach first, hitting, advanced to second on a wild pitch and died there while Bonney and George Morris fanned and Cunningham went out. Hyberg to Dickens.

Dickens hit in the third and took second on Buckmaster's sacrifice. Hall hit and Springer's two-bagger cleaned up the bases. Maupin blanked again and in the fourth, with two down, Foley walked. Dickens singled and Foley scored on Miller's error in handling Buckmaster's grounder.

At the opening of the fifth, George Morris reached first on Hall's error and second on Cunningham's hit. Confer filed out to Springer and Morris went to third on Springer's poor throw. Miller clouted the ball beyond the infield, but Clifford's throw cut off Morris at home. Chastain scored Cunningham and A. Morris' drive to center field scored Miller and Chastain. It was Maupin's last scoring until the final inning.

**Foley Benched.**  
 Buckmaster replaced Foley on the mound in the sixth, Slate supplanting Buckmaster in left field. In the succeeding half, Slate singled, Dickens walked, Buckmaster filed out to George Morris and Hall fanned. Springer's hit scored Slate and De Armond's three-bagger scored Dickens and Springer. De Lashmutt fanned.

Byberg singled in the seventh and Clifford's fly was smothered by Glen Morris. Slate hit and Byberg, who had advanced to third, scored. Dickens singled, then beat the peg from home to second, while Slate scored. He took third on Buckmaster's single, and scored when Springer's drive was fielded to first too late to produce results. Miller replaced Bonney in the box for Maupin.

In the eighth De Lashmutt singled and Byberg followed suit, going out at second on Confer's assist, while Clifford reached first and De Lashmutt annexed third. De Lashmutt trotted in when Rennie tried to peg Clifford out at second. Clifford went to third on Dickens' hit and scored on catcher's error.

**Maupin Makes Strong Finish.**  
 With one out in the ninth, George Morris' grounder to De Lashmutt was muffed, and a wild pitch advanced the runner to second. Cunningham fanned. Confer doubled, scoring Morris. Miller doubled, scoring Confer, but in trying to stretch the hit to three sacks, was caught by Springer's throw, relayed to third.
