POWER WILL BE DEVELOPED ON TUMALO CREEK

HEAD OF B. W. L. & P. CO. TELLS PLANS

FUTURE NEEDS SEEN

Development Cost May Exceed \$250,000—Charles A. Brown, President of Company, Here on First Visit in 5 Years.

Announcement that power development on Tumalo creek will be definitely started this summer or early in the fall, was made today by Charles A. Brown, president of the Bend Water, Light & Power company, who arrived this morning from the central offices of the company in Chicago. Mr. Brown is accompanied by his wife and son and may remain for a week in Central Oregon before starting on his return trip east.

How extensive the development on the Tumalo may be Mr. Brown was unable to state this morning, but the cost of the two plants which are contemplated in the company's plans for the future will probably be in excess of \$250,000, it was intimated. "Whatever the cost, Bend's needs will be taken care of," Mr. Brown said.

With the recent completion of the steam auxiliary plant, near the Brooks-Scanlon mill, which transforms wood waste into electric power, local demands are now being taken care of, but Mr. Brown is convinced that the steady growth of Bend will soon make the present sources of power inadequate. It is to make provision for future needs that plans for construction on the Tumalo are now being worked out by Mr. Brown, T. H. Foley, local manager, and Engineer Hogle, also from the Chicago office.

Mr. Brown's visit is the first he has made to Bend in five years.

LITHUANIANS READY TO LAUNCH ATTACK

Will Wage War on Poles in Accordance With Agreement Signed With the Bolsheviks.

LONDON, July 13.—Lithuanian troops are reported to be mobilizing for an attack on the Poles, in accordance with an agreement signed by Lithuania and the Russian soviet, according to a newspaper dispatch received here from Kovno. The Polish troops have retired to a new line of defense and are destroying means of communication in their retreat, according to an official wireless dispatch from Warsaw.

DESTROYERS ON WAY TO TAKU

FEAR PEKIN ATTACK

Chinese Capital May be Menaced by Factional Fighting Between Revolutionary Forces—Famine's Shadow Over Land.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—The United States battleship Huron and three destroyers have gone to Taku, the nearest seaport to Peking, to offer protection to Americans in case of an attack on the Chinese capital, the navy department announced today. Peking may be menaced by possible factional fighting between Chinese revolutionary forces.

SHANGHAI, July 13.—Profiteering has hit the uncounted millions of China's poor and famine threatens. There is a rice shortage here that has created a condition which may be mildly described as acute. It is really to be described only in the superlative.

Daily the Settlement's police forces receive word of the discovery of dead bodies of men, women and children, evident victims of starvation, being found by roadsides where they have been left because of families too stricken by poverty to pay for proper burial, and trusting to the humanity of the foreign population to conduct the accustomed rites.

Excessive export of rice to Japan is blamed by the Chinese for the hunger of the people in this country. Whether this is true, or whether a "corner" exists is what the authorities are attempting to discover.

Quotations on rice rose, a few days ago, to the unprecedented height of \$11 a picul—approximately 133 pounds. As a result the Chinese authorities in the Native City of Shanghai have opened rice exchanges where the food, which is the chief sustenance of the native population, is being sold for \$7 a picul.

Similar conditions exist today throughout China and the outcome of the official investigation now pending may have a far reaching effect on the future of the Chinese republic.

LABOR SITUATION SERIOUS IN JAPAN

Slump in Prices Causes Closing of Factories and 162,000 Are Now Out of Work.

TOKIO, July 13.—The labor situation in Japan is becoming quite serious, owing to the closing of many factories on account of the "great slump in prices. A few months ago, when the country was still riding high on the wave of prosperity, labor was short and, as a consequence, workers were able to secure advances in wages and other advantages. Now the situation has changed entirely, and the government is taking steps to combat the evils of unemployment which have already begun to set in.

The slump has hit the weaving industries particularly badly. Thus the Yenshu Textile company threw 12,000 men out of work recently, and many other factories have either discharged their men absolutely, or have laid them off for the time being, hoping for better times to come. Mines, match factories and other industrial concerns have been compelled to follow suit, and it is reported by the authorities that during May, 56 big establishments closed, throwing about 50,000 workers out of work, while many smaller concerns have added their troubles to the general confusion.

The department of commerce and agriculture estimates that 162,000 workers have been discharged since January and hopefully suggests that many of these may have found new jobs. The situation is aggravated, however, through the fact that Japan's industries are located in comparatively few centers and, as a consequence, the evils are concentrated where they occur and cause very considerable hardship.

OVER NIAGARA FALLS IN A BARREL



C. J. Stephens of Bristol, England, yesterday attempted the last of a series of dare-devil stunts extending over the better part of his life. In a barrel designed to test the efficiency of a newly invented oxygen tank he went over Niagara falls yesterday, but the barrel was found in pieces, with no trace of Stephens. Stephens was 58 years of age.

LABOR SIDES WITH IRELAND

BRITISH TRADES UNIONS CONGRESS IN SESSION AT WESTMINSTER, DEMANDS WITHDRAWAL OF TROOPS.

LONDON, July 13.—A resolution demanding an immediate truce between the warring factions in Ireland and the withdrawal of the British army was adopted at Westminster today at a special meeting of the Trades Union congress, representing thousands of British workers.

The resolution proposed a general strike ballot unless the troops are withdrawn from Ireland.

NAVY LIFE TO BE SHOWN IN MOVIES

San Francisco and Portland Recruiting Officers in Bend to Stimulate Interest in Service.

To place before the public accurate information concerning the United States navy, Howard N. Smith, chief yeoman from the San Francisco office, and C. H. Oppen, chief electrician from the Portland office, arrived in Bend this morning and will present at the Liberty theater tonight and tomorrow night a series of films showing heavy gunfire, both day and night, firing torpedoes and depth bombs in the North sea, and other features of naval life.

Most interesting to the parents of prospective recruits, says Mr. Smith, are the scenes showing the boys at work on shipboard, the ship's school where educational training is provided, and the navy's playground at Guantanamo, Cuba. Mr. Smith will lecture as the various films are presented.

The appearance in Bend of the two navy men and the showing of the navy's educational movies is a part of the campaign for 500 recruits, which is considered as the proper quota for the state of Oregon.

WOMAN URGES MOISTURE TO REPLACE ALCOHOLIC DROUTH

PORTLAND, Ore., July 13.—The present prohibition law means "prohibition for the poor man and license for the rich," according to Miss Elizabeth Marbury of New York city, who is visiting here on her way home from San Francisco, where she attended the democratic national convention as a delegate at large from New York state. "Moist, but merciful," that's my slogan," said Miss Marbury. "However, I'm not in favor of the saloons or the liquor traffic. But now the time has come for more liberality. It is a practical impossibility to enforce a force prohibition. It would take a million men to enforce it, and just see what a tremendous expense that would be to taxpayers. "A law that cannot be enforced is unethical; it encourages law-breaking, lying and hypocrisy. I want to play the game fairly, so that the man with the slim purse may have the same privileges as the man with the fat purse. So, I say, let us have beer and light wines. "There is a shortage of labor in New York, and it is a direct result of the fact that the foreigners are leaving at the rate of 1000 a week, and they are leaving because they cannot get the light wines to which they are accustomed. "All of this talk about building a strong, healthy manhood through prohibition! I would like to see a finer body of young men, mentally and physically, than those 2,000,000 who went overseas from this country, yet they went to victory before we had this drastic prohibition law."

RIVER FALLS TO OLD LEVEL

MEMORIES OF EARLIER DAYS RECALLED BY DRAINING OF IMPOUNDED WATER TO ALLOW FOR TURBINE GATE REPAIR.

Memories of the early days were brought back to old timers in Bend today when they saw the Deschutes river down to its natural channel for the first time in 10 years. The level of the water had dropped more than 10 feet.

Draining of the water impounded by the power dam at Newport avenue was started yesterday by the Bend Water, Power & Light company, in order to make possible repairs at the company's main plant here. Two of the three wheels at the plant have not been overhauled since their installation, seven years ago, and the arrival of a new turbine gate to replace similar damaged equipment was the signal for the lowering of the river.

ARMISTICE TO BE ACCEPTED

PROPOSALS MADE BY ALLIES IN BEHALF OF POLISH NATION ACCEDDED TO BY BOLSHEVIKI IN MESSAGE TO PREMIER.

SPA, July 13.—Premier Lloyd-George of Great Britain has received a message from Russian bolshevik officials accepting the proposals of the allies for an armistice between the Poles and the bolsheviks, it was learned authoritatively today.

CRACK BOXERS WILL FIGHT BEFORE ELKS

All-Star Program Arranged for Entertainment of Convention in Salem on July 23.

SALEM, July 13.—Joe Gorman of Portland, present holder of the title, and Earl Baird of Seattle, contender, are to battle for the Pacific coast featherweight championship in the main event of 34 rounds of boxing to be staged by the Salem lodge of Elks at the state fair grounds auditorium on the night of July 23, the second day of the third annual convention of Oregon Elk lodges. They will travel over the 10-round route.

Such is the announcement of the sports committee of the convention organization, made public today.

With the exception of one six-round preliminary bout, all of the contracts for the four bouts to be staged have been signed, and the lineup presents one of the most imposing cards arranged for any Pacific coast city in recent years.

In a second 10-round go, Johnnie McCarty, San Francisco claimant of the coast welterweight championship, has been matched to meet Alex Trambitas, the Portland lad, who is rapidly making a name for himself.

Mexican Troops of Huerta Army Start Uprising

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, July 13.—Thirteen hundred Mexican federal troops, members of the Huerta forces, have started a new revolution south of Laredo, threatening the Nuevo Laredo district, according to advices received from across the border. Railroad communication between Monterey and Lampason has been cut off by the revolting troops.

RUSSIAN REDS SLAY BRITON

ENGLISHMAN KILLED IN NIKOL-SIEVSK, AND AMERICANS NARROWLY ESCAPE DEATH AT HANDS OF ANARCHISTS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—John Freedman, British subject, was executed, and several Americans barely escaped death at the hands of an anarchistic band of Russian bolsheviks known as the "red black guard," during the reign of terror at Nikolsievsk, Siberia, according to a report from the state department from the American consul at Vladivostok.

REBELS TAKE OVER BOLIVIA

REPUBLICAN LEADER ASSUMES PROVISIONAL PRESIDENCY—COUNTER-REVOLUTION WILL BE STARTED, IS BELIEF.

SANTIAGO, Chile, July 13.—The Bolivian government has been overthrown by revolutionists and the republican leader, Saavedra, has assumed the provisional presidency of the republic, according to dispatches received today from the capital, where government military forces joined the revolutionists.

It is not known whether or not the rest of the country had joined in the uprising, but troops are reported to be marching from many cities to the capital to take part in the movement. Dispatches from Antofagasta said that President Gutierrez-Gerra and his cabinet have fled.

It is believed that a counter revolution will be started immediately.

JUSTICE RULES FOR SUFFRAGE BACKERS

Opponents of 19th Amendment Fail To Get Injunction Against the Ratification Proclamation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—Opponents of woman suffrage today received a temporary setback in their attempts to forestall operation of the 19th amendment after ratification. Justice Bailey of the District of Columbia supreme court denied a petition for an injunction to restrain Secretary of State Colby from issuing a proclamation of ratification of the amendment.

RAPID DECLINE OF TEMPERATURE SEEN

Maximum Falls 32 Degrees From Hottest of Season in Period of Less Than One Week.

A most rapid decline of temperature for this season of year is noted in the readings of the government thermometer here for the six days beginning with July 8. On that date the maximum recorded was 92 degrees, equaling the hottest weather of the season, while this afternoon the maximum reached only 59 degrees, 32 degrees lower than the highest temperature reached less than a week ago.

LIBERAL UNITS VOTE TO JOIN THEIR FORCES

UNITY CONVENTION IS NOW IN SESSION

PLANKS ARE ADOPTED

Laborites and Committee of 48 Endorse Plumb Railroad Plan and Nationalization of Mines—Capital Tax Still at Issue

CHICAGO, July 13.—The national convention, called here by the committee of 48, today voted unanimously to amalgamate with the labor party; fixing 2 o'clock this afternoon as the hour to meet with them. The vote to amalgamate was taken on the report of the committee on political procedure, which was adopted unanimously by conference committees from the labor party and the "forty-eighters."

Amid the blare of bands, tooting of horns and shouts of hundreds of men and women, the "unity convention" of liberal groups merged for the formation of a third party, got under way here this afternoon.

The labor party convention in session here unanimously adopted the plan of amalgamation worked out out by the joint sub-committee of the labor convention and the committee of 48. Adoption of the fusion plan followed notification by the committee from the "forty-eighters" that their convention had decided to meet this afternoon with the laborites.

Delegates representing the farmers, organization marched into the convention of the labor party shortly after the receipt of word that the committee of 48 had decided to unite with labor.

Shortly before the committee of 48 convention recessed to attend the joint convention, the platform committee announced acceptance of nationalization of mines and the Plumb railroad plan, leaving only the capital tax levy issue in dispute. Regarding this, it was stated that an agreement is in sight.

FIREMEN PLAN TO ORGANIZE PATROL

Increased Efficiency in Fire Fighting Aim—Public Thanked For Assistance at Big Blaze.

Organization of a firemen's patrol, drawing its membership from citizens of Bend not at present members of the fire department, will be accomplished within the near future if the plans endorsed last night by the firemen at their regular meeting are carried out. The patrol will, like the department, be a volunteer organization, will have police powers during a fire, and would make possible even more effective work on the part of the department, is the belief of Chief Tom Carlson. A special committee is now at work on various questions connected with the formation of the patrol.

The committee on the Elk lake firemen's summer home reported that excellent progress is being made in the erection of the department's cabin. The lake is being frequently visited by firemen off duty.

The secretary was instructed to prepare a letter expressing the thanks of the volunteers for the valuable assistance extended last Tuesday night by Bend citizens not members of the department.

COAL MINE OWNERS MAY AVERT FAMINE

Meeting With Railroad Executives in New York City Is Scheduled For Tomorrow.
