EVENING GOWNS FOR WINTER INDIVIDUAL

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Evening gowns of the fall and winter season seem to promise more scope for individuality than the street and afternoon dresses which so dogmatically declare that slinkiness is absolutely the only silhouette.

It is true that the swathed effect takes title role even in evening gowns, but there are a few exceptions. The very top-notch evening gown—the sort that would be worn at a Blue Bird ball, if such a social event should happen all over again, is merely a very few yards of shiny material bound round and round the figure.

Such a model of jet over a fitted underslip of black satin is the piece de resistance of a Fifth Avenue house which specializes in "clothes for after 6." Complying with the vogue for some covering over the epidermis, the sleeves of this model are of sheer chiffon, and even envelope the wrist. There is no back, but a long train atones for any seeming deficit. A novel note is given by the sash of tulle which floats over the hips and is caught in a wired bow as wide as the entire frock. The streamers of this sash float to the floor. A corsage of deep-toned artificial roses is the only touch of color on the gown.

A similar figure-revealing gown is shown of electric blue spangles over the same shade of velvet. A fringe of Orientally-hued beads falls from the bodice, shoulder-straps, and over the hips. A huge bow of tulle floats from the left shoulder.

The more bouffant evening gowns are shown for the debutantes who have not sufficient maturity of bearing and face to wear the Theda Bara gown. A charming model is shown on the Avenue of dove chiffon over coral satin. Soft bands of deeper-toned marabou finish the top of the

bodice and are used for shoulder straps. The Turkish harem effect is retained by the shirred-in skirt hem.

Combinations of net or lace with taffetas and softer silks are much in the vogue for these pannered and puffed soubretish dresses. Bright shades of flame, canary, emerald and turquoise and peacock blue abound in the debutante gowns, while black laces, nets, jet and satin are the more mature woman's favorites.
