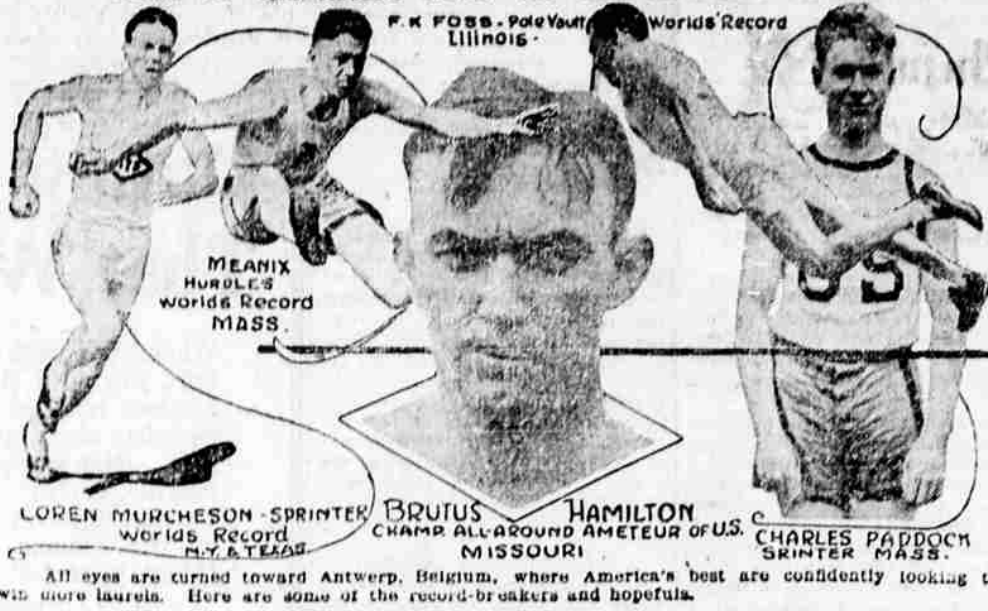

**MANY TEACHERS DO NOT RETURN**

COUNTY INSTITUTE IS SET FOR SEPT. 1—SCHOOL OPENS FRIDAY THE 7TH—MORE PLACES WANTED TO ROOM TEACHERS.

County Superintendent of Schools J. Alton Thompson is busy working out the details of the county institute, which will be held in Bend September 1 to 3. Among the speakers expected is Professor John Almack of the extension department of the University of Oregon, who will deliver several addresses of a nature which will interest citizens of Bend as well as teachers.

The schools will not open until Tuesday, September 7, but all of the teachers will be here for the institute. Principal E. J. Crozier is expected to arrive here Monday, to plan in touch with conditions and plan the year's work before school opens.

The response to the call for places for the teachers to room has been very gratifying, says Superintendent Moore, but more offers are desired. In place of the superintendent's office finding places for out of town girls to work while attending school, the work will be handled by the Woman's Protective league, under the personal supervision of Mrs. Stockwell.

The teaching vacancies have not all been filled, but acceptances are coming in from those already elected. There are three yet to be elected.

Of last year's force of teachers, over 50 per cent will not return this year, so that with the added number a large share of this year's staff will be newcomers. Superintendent Moore was able to give the plans of most of those who taught last year and will not return.

Miss Harker, Miss Rudolph and Miss Khorbes are going to Honolulu to teach in a government school. Minnie Thompson is also going to Honolulu.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson and Miss McCorkle will teach in Seattle. Miss

McClay will register at the University of Oregon.

Miss Scribner, music and art director, has accepted a more remunerative position in Arizona.

Miss Hanson is working in a bank in Corvallis.

Miss Ryan will teach in Portland, as will Miss Olson and Miss Damon. Miss Pruehs will attend University of Colorado.

Four of the teachers have married: Miss Cane, Miss Cheney, Miss Ferris and Miss Reavis, who married F. W. Fowler of Bend.

**Aspirin and Quinine.**

A Spanish physician has found as the result of a year's experience that the combination of aspirin and quinine is undesirable and may be dangerous. According to the Scientific American's account of the investigation, the catalytic action of aspirin in the stomach changes the quinine to a poisonous derivative called quino-toxin. The poison is said to cause death, though the Spanish investigator records no fatal cases.

MEXICAN FEDERAL TROOPS ARE LANDED IN LOWER CALIFORNIA TO CHASTISE GOVERNOR OF PROVINCE.
