

RED REGIME ENDANGERED BY STRIKERS

ANTI-BOLSHEVIK WAVE SWEEPS RUSSIA

ARMIES CRUMBLING

Wrangel Destroys Red Divisions Near Alexandrovsk—Soviet Forces Are Surrounded At Vertoyotok—Poles Scatter the Enemy.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin)

LONDON, Oct. 2.—An anti-Bolshevik wave is sweeping over Russia and consternation is reigning in Moscow, according to Helsingfors dispatches.

Reports from various sources indicated a further crumbling of the Bolshevik armies on all fronts. A Constantinople dispatch said that General Wrangel has completely destroyed several Red divisions in the region of Alexandrovsk.

On the Polish front the Bolsheviks were completely routed in the Lida region, according to a Warsaw communique.

A Moscow communique admitted the evacuation of Lida and Baranovitchi, but claimed the repulse of the Poles along the Azda and Lutch rivers.

AIRPLANE WAITING FOR NEW PROPELLER

NO MORE LAST MINUTE FILING BY CANDIDATES

NEW NOMINATION LAW IN EFFECT

OCTOBER 15 LAST DAY

Petitions Signed By 10 Per Cent of Number of Voters At Previous Elections Necessary To Qualify Aspirant, Council Decides.

Last minute filings in the future of candidates for city offices were effectively prevented last night when the Bend city council passed, under an emergency clause, an ordinance which establishes the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, beginning with this year, as the biennial election date.

No report as to when paving will be started could be given because of delays on the part of Portland bond lawyers who are passing on the legality of the council's proceedings bearing on the proposed improvement.

WITNESS TO TELL STORY AT HEARING

WILL QUOTE ALLEGED KILLER, STATED

IDENTITY WITHHELD

Weston Said To Have Given Details of Hermit's Death, In Presence of Two—Faith of His Wife and Daughter Remains Unshaken.

Reasons underlying the arrest of A. J. Weston, charged with the murder of Robert H. Krug, hermit rancher of Sisters, in March, 1919, were disclosed last night when Sheriff S. E. Roberts and H. H. De Armond, who, with R. S. Hamilton, is acting as a special prosecutor in the case, stated that they have two witnesses who will testify that Weston boasted to them of torturing Krug in a vain endeavor to make him disclose the hiding place of his money, and of finally killing the aged man and firing the building.

The authorities are unwilling at present to disclose the identity of the two star witnesses. One of them, it is known, is now in Portland, and has received instructions to report here Tuesday for the preliminary hearing.

Wife Firm In Faith Called from Portland where she was visiting at the time of the arrest, Mrs. Weston arrived here last night to consult with her husband in regard to the details of the trial.

In a statement given out this morning relative to the case, Mrs. A. J. Moore, wife of the district attorney, expressed her firm belief in her father's innocence.

Weston was interviewed late yesterday afternoon, but refused to make any statement other than that he would fight the charge.

As he talked the prisoner paced nervously back and forth in his cell. After his morning's session with the barber he appeared 10 years younger than at the time of his arraignment in justice court, a few hours before.

Weston has been a resident of Deschutes county for a number of years and is known throughout the Sisters and Squaw creek country for his tremendous strength and his absolute fearlessness.

News of the arrest recalled the story of a gun fight in which Weston is said to have participated in the early days in Madras, in which, after he was riddled with bullets, he eluded with his assailant and overpowered him.
