CLUB CAMPAIGN HEADQUARTERS OPENED TODAY

club met with Mr. Schouboe late yesterday and the latter outlined in a very general way the plan he has mapped out for the Bend campaign. Briefly, the first two weeks of the campaign will be devoted to an educational and preparatory period. The drive will be conducted during the week of November 8. The city will be divided into two districts—the Blue and the White, each under the leadership of a division major, who will command eight captains. These captains will be placed in charge of teams of five workers each and for three days, during two hours of the forenoon, the field organization will conduct a city-wide canvass for members and service fund pledges. The work will be systematized so that no time will be lost in canvassing the city. Cards bearing the names and addresses of the various prospective members will be placed in the hands of the team workers after they have been arranged and districted by attaches of the local postoffice.
