POLICE CHIEF QUILTS JOB AT END OF YEAR

NEW COUNCIL CAUSE FOR ACTION

ORDER MORE PAVING

Resolutions of Intention for Congress and Delaware Passed at Council session—Bids to Be Opened Tuesday.

The first result of the municipal election held in Bend Tuesday was seen last night when Chief of Police L. A. W. Nixon, for six years an officer in Bend, tendered his resignation to take effect at 6 o'clock on the evening of December 31.

"I have always worked in accord with the administration but I feel that if I continued in office after this year that such a condition would no longer be possible.

Two more streets in Bend were slated for hard-surfacing, when the council received the report of City Engineer Robert B. Gould on the Delaware avenue and Congress improvements, and passed resolutions of intention.

To Open Bids Tuesday The ordinance definitely placing the management of the cemetery in the hands of the newly created cemetery association, was read for the second time and passed.

Four fires occurred during the past month, Fire Chief Tom Carlson stated, in his monthly summary of the work of the department.

The viewers' report compiled by C. A. Warner, Joseph Innes, and E. A. Sather, assessing benefits and damages incident to the widening of the alley of block two, city of

IRISH WAGING GUERRILLA WAR

SINN FEINERS, POLICE AND SOLDIERS LOSE LIVES IN RAIDS AND ATTACKS BY BOTH SIDES.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Guerrilla warfare is reported from various parts of Ireland. Despite police reprisals, the Sinn Feiners are continuing to attack and ambush forces of soldiers and "Black and Tans."

The Dublin message stated that a British Marine was killed and two more wounded in a Sinn Fein attack on the coast guard station at Union Hill.

FEAR IS FELT FOR WELFARE OF AMERICANS

SLAVS AND MONGOLS ATTACK URGU

APPEAL SENT CHINA

Engineer and Employee of the Mongolian Trade Co. Among Residents of City Which Yellow Soldiers Are Looting.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin) WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Fears are entertained for the safety of two Americans at Urgu, the capital of outer Mongolia which has been attacked by armed Russians, Buriats, and Mongols, the state department today announced.

The Americans are mills, engineer and McLaughlin, employees of the Mongolian trade company. The United States legation at Peking has made urgent representations to the Chinese government to afford every possible protection.

CONCESSIONS NOT RECOGNIZED

CLUB CAMPAIGN MAJORS READY TO BEGIN WORK

CANVASS WILL START ON MONDAY

TO LAST THREE DAYS

Three Hundred Members and Service Fund of \$7500 Will Be Goal—Reorganization to Come Immediately After.

Plans and arrangements are all completed for the city wide canvass for memberships and service funds for the reorganization of the Bend Commercial club and the building of a thoroughly modern, scientific civic-commercial organization that will serve as a great clearing house for the best thought and effort of all the community interests.

The field organization, which is one of the largest and most representative bodies that has ever banded together in a forward movement for Bend, is marking time today and Sunday, and making ready for the "zero hour" when the entire "army" will "go over the top."

As has been previously explained, the field army is to work in two divisions to be designated as the blue and the white and these divisions are in charge of Major H. A. Miller, and Major H. J. Overturf. Each major has six team captains, and each captain from four to five workers. The goal will be a membership of not less than 300 members and a service fund of at least \$7,500.

No More "Hat Passing"

With the opening of the Bend Commercial club reorganization campaign the membership dues were increased from \$18 to \$25 a year. This action was taken after it was found that 85 per cent of the successful civic-commercial organizations of the United States have annual dues of \$25 a year or more.

The income from dues of the new organization will be used for salaries, office maintenance, routine activities and the keeping in operation of an efficient machine for the performance of civic-commercial organization service.

The annual service fund of \$7,500 to be raised in addition is required for the execution of a program of permanent work and the financing of matters which in times past have been paid for haphazardly by "passing the hat."

To Use Budget Plan

So far as possible, all affairs that may come under the regular program of work of the club during the year demanding money will be anticipated in the budget and adequate funds provided for them; so that it will be unnecessary to keep circulating subscription lists for one purpose and another repeatedly during the year.

The daily reports to be made by the different teams—twelve teams of men and two of women—are expected to develop considerable interest and an unusual degree of friendly rivalry. The teams will meet at 9 a.m., each day of the drive, and after receiving instructions will go out and work for two hours in enrolling memberships and service fund pledges for the new organization.

An installation director of the American City Bureau will arrive in Bend next week and after the membership enrollment has been completed, will immediately start in setting up the "machinery" of the new organization. The membership will be organized, new by-laws adopted, directors elected and officers chosen. A definite program of work will also be prepared by the membership. When finally completed.
