TWO COUNCILS
WILL CONVENEBUDGET MEETING SET
FOR TUESDAY

New Administration Asked To Take Active Part In Estimating City Expenditures To Be Allowed During The Coming Year.

A joint meeting of the city council now in office and of the council-elect will be held Tuesday night of next week to discuss the details of Bend's budget for the coming year, Mayor Eastes announced. Mr. Eastes has instructed each committee chairman on the council to have ready an estimate of the expenditures which will be required for the various departments of city government in 1921, and it is probable that on these recommendations the new budget will be virtually decided.

The invitation to the council-elect was made by Mayor Eastes through Mayor-Elect Gilson. "I am particularly anxious that the new city administration should have a hand in making up the new budget, for it is the new council, not the outgoing administration, that will have the spending of the funds appropriated," Mr. Eastes said. "I hope that every one of the council elected last week will be in attendance and will feel perfectly free to enter into the discussion."

May Name Manager.
Another matter on which Mayor Eastes has conferred with Mr. Gilson is in regard to the appointment of a city recorder. It has long been the belief of the mayor and of the council that the recordership should be a full time position, allowing the incumbent to assume virtually the duties of a city manager. This is now

deemed all the more necessary because of the large amount of work which will be under way in 1921 in connection with the city's street improvement program. In discussing the matter with the mayor-elect, Mr. Eastes suggested that if the new administration, before it goes into office wishes to designate a candidate, he will be glad to make the appointment.

Miss Nell Markell, the present recorder, was appointed shortly after the resignation of Fred A. Woolfien, with the understanding that her tenure of office might not be of long duration. While her work has been eminently satisfactory, she would be unable to devote sufficient time to the office in case the city manager-ship feature were to be introduced, Mr. Eastes said.

To Remove Lead From Gunbarrels.
Chemically pure and strong nitric acid will dissolve the lead in a gun-barrel, and will not injure the metal of the barrel unless the acid becomes diluted with a little water. To remove the acid, pour all of it out and wipe the gun dry with a rag soaked in olive or cottonseed oil. Do not get the acid on the hands or clothes. If by chance this happens it should be washed off immediately with water and then some weak alkali.
