This is the solemn and scientific assurance of Professor C. Dopter of the famous Val-de-Grace hospital at He has just published the full statistics and reports of the hospital on the Spanish flu epidemic since its original arrival in 1918, which demonstrate conclusively that one attack of thed isease establishes immunity.


