

**YOU CAN'T CATCH REAL 'FLU' TWICE**

Those Recovering From Disease In 1918 or 1919 Immunized Against The Disease, Is Declared.

PARIS, Nov. 24.—If you had the real Spanish flu back in 1918 and 1919, and didn't die of it, you won't have it again.

You can start in the winter with a perfectly light heart and no worry whatsoever as to how you would treat yourself in the event of a fresh attack—now that the time-honored whiskey and quinine cure is no longer integrally available.

This is the solemn and scientific assurance of Professor C. Dopter of the famous Val-de-Grace hospital at Paris. He has just published the full statistics and reports of the hospital on the Spanish flu epidemic since its original arrival in 1918, which demonstrate conclusively that one attack of the disease establishes immunity.

In other words, the disease itself creates within the victim, if he doesn't die, a transformation of the organism which renders it impossible for the same cause to produce the

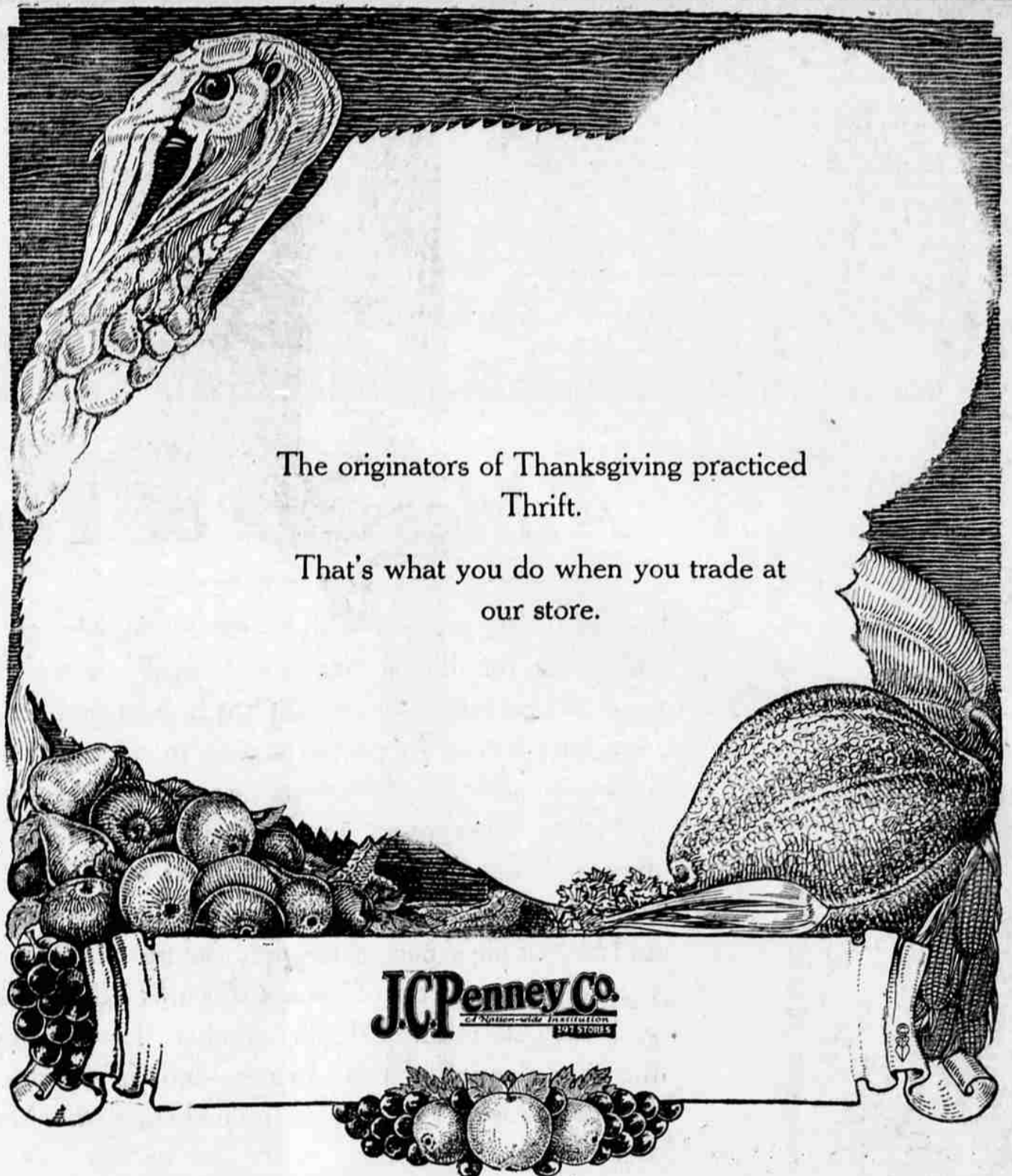
same effects as regards the disease in question.

From the standpoint of statistics Professor Dopter points out that the Spanish flu of 1918 and 1919 came in two waves. It was quickly demonstrated that those who had the disease during the first wave did not contract it during the second. This has proved equally true in all subsequent epidemics. This also explains the fact, noted almost everywhere, that aged people placed in microbe-infested surroundings, resisted better the disease than young people who had not yet had a chance to become immune.

The conclusions drawn from these statistics and observations have also demonstrated their truth by experiments conducted by Professor Dopter. Volunteer patients who were given an infection of flu microbes came down with the disease in four days. The experiment, tried later on the same individuals, produced no result whatever, their organisms having become immune.

BERLIN, Nov. 24.—Fritz Schaaf, Hotel Adlon page, jumped into a fortune. That is literally true. A film company wanted someone who would jump from a tower several hundred feet high into a net. Schaaf, 19 years old, allowed he was willing to try a "Steve Brodie," especially as there was money in it. He jumped, while the movie machine cranked, and came out sound, except for a wrenched ankle. The company has put 75,000 marks in trust for him until he is of age, after which he hopes eventually to get into the hotel or restaurant business for himself. The money is about the equivalent of an ordinary worker's wages for six years.
