School Records For Last Nine Years Furnish Repast For Rambouillets in Hampton---Stiff Wind Opens Door

Rambling Rambouillets, with a fondness for the printed and the written word, are responsible for the destruction of the records of the Hampton school kept for the last nine years and containing the names of all the children who have ever attended school in the district. This was the report this morning of County Superintendent J. Alton Thompson, on his return from a tour of inspection of the schools of the High Desert.

In the course of his journey, he arrived at Hampton, and asked the teacher, Miss Mary Stauffer, to see her register. Miss Stauffer regretted that she could not comply with his request, but explained that on Sunday a stiff wind had blown the schoolhouse door open, and that wandering sheep, wearled of a bunch grass diet, had entered the building, eaten the record book, and also devoured several texts which had been left. The backs of books, rejected as unfit for food, still bore the imprints of sheep teeth, Mr. Thompson declared.
