**Sicily Practically Treeless.**  
Sicily is practically a treeless country. In a journey of 150 miles across the island, one can not observe a single tree that would cut a ten-inch board. Wide boards (14-inch) of Italian origin are employed in the making of heavy boxes for the shipment of licorice. The wood is a species of Calabrian fir.

**Exclusive Organization.**  
Though legendarily reputed to be more than 1,000 years old, the Order of the Thistle was founded by James II in 1687. After the revolution, says the London Star, it fell into desuetude, but was revived by Queen Anne in 1703. The chapel of the order, in St. Giles cathedral, where the king attended service on Sunday, was not commenced until 1699. The Thistle is one of the most exclusive orders, its only members being the king and 16 knights. The motto of the order is: "Wha daur meddle with me."
