tends the length of South America, just east of the Andes. Explorers of a dozen countries are scurrying the length and breadth of this region, with American companies easily in the lead, both in the number of parties in the field and in the amount of acreage for which concessions have been obtained. Great reticence and secrecy have been maintained by American oil interests about their South American prospects and accomplishments. Government reports here indicate, however, that American concessions are so extensively scattered through every possible field in South America that, wherever the "big gush" comes, oil men from this country will probably be in a position to control the largest acreage of any foreign group.

Historic Estate on Market. The Stoke Park estate, once the home of the Penns, has been placed on the market. On this property is a monument put up by John Penn in memory of the poet, Gray. On three sides are quotations from the Elogy, on the fourth is an inscription saying that the stone was erected in 1790 "among the scenery celebrated by the great Lyric and Elegiac Poet," and that he "lies unnoticed in the adjoining churchyard under the tombstone on which he proudly and pathetically recorded the interment of his aunt and lamented mother." The hope is expressed that the property will not fall into hands that will permit this monument, "which in a sense has become historic, to fall into ruin."—London Times.

Philippine Coal. Signs of industrial expansion in the Philippine Islands are seen in the recent formation of a company which is developing the Cebu coal mines as well as those in Mindanao. It is expected that within a comparatively short time the output of these two islands will be sufficient to supply the needs of the whole archipelago as regards good steam coal. The Mindanao product, which comes from what is known as the Sibuguyon coal field, is asserted on the one hand to be superior to any other Philippine coal or any coal imported into the islands, while on the other hand it is said to be liable to deteriorate if not used promptly.

In Northern Chile. Northern Chile depends almost wholly upon two industries, nitrate and copper mining. Of these, the former is more important, both from the standpoint of extensive operation and the direct economic effect upon the population as a whole.
