

POOR MAN MAY NOW BE BRITISH CHIEF

Prime Minister Given Official Place of Residence Within Easy Distance of London.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Britain's prime ministers have at last an official place of residence, Premier Lloyd George being the first occupant of the beautiful estate, known as the Chequers, in Buckinghamshire, which was presented to the nation by Lord Lee of Fareham "as a thanksgiving for her deliverance in the great war" and as "a place of rest and recreation for her prime ministers forever."

It is generally assumed that No. 10 Downing street, London, is the official residence of the premier, but this is not so, as the office of prime minister is not recognized by the constitution. No. 10 is the official residence of the first lord of the treasury, just as No. 11 Downing street is the residence of the chancellor of the exchequer. Usually the premier takes the office of first lord of the treasury, but he cannot occupy No. 10 Downing street unless he does—except by the grace of the proper occupant.

The Chequers, which is within handy reach of London, however, is specifically designed for the prime minister, whatever other office he may hold. Premiers like the late Marquis of Salisbury, the Earl of Rosebery, the late Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman and Arthur Balfour had huge estates, but Premier Lloyd George is a comparatively poor man, as was ex-Premier Asquith.

NEW AIRLINER TO CARRY 6,000 POUNDS

Initial Flight of Big Plane Scheduled To Be Made Soon—Berths and Showers Are Planned.

MILWAUKEE, Feb. 7.—The City of La Crosse, first of a fleet of mammoth air liners being constructed, is scheduled to make its initial flight soon, according to Alfred W. Lawson, inventor and builder.

The Lawson ship will carry 16 passengers, as well as at least 1500 pounds of mail, or without passengers will carry 6000 pounds of mail and express.
