Mrs. A. M. O'Toole, who has been visiting her sister, Mrs. O. A. Nosen of Bend, left this morning for her home in Portland.

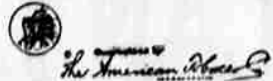
Mrs. H. C. Weaver, accompanied by her mother, returned this morning from Portland, where she spent the past five weeks.

BODY OF SOLDIER TO BE BROUGHT TO BEND

Burial of Man Who Died Overseas Will Be Made Here, War Department Advises The Local Post.

Percy A. Stevens post, American Legion, has received word from the war department that the body of a Deschutes county soldier, formerly buried in France, is to be shipped to Bend for final interment. The name of the soldier and the date of the arrival of the body were not included in the war department's notice.

Funeral services for the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Dunn, Deschutes county ranchers, are to be held early in the week. The young man, a member of the aviation service, died recently at camp in Alabama. The parents received word by wire that their son was seriously ill, and this news was followed almost immediately by word of his death. The body is expected to arrive Sunday night.

MENTALITY MENDED BY MONKEY GLAND

Nineteen Year Old Girl With Arrested Brain Development, Makes Gains Under Thyroid Treatment

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Nineteen-year-old Mary Zundak, whose broken mentality was mended by the transplanting of a monkey's thyroid gland in her neck, is marooned in a hospital here while physicians wait for philanthropists to come to her aid.

Mary's brain snapped when stricken with infantile paralysis when she was six months old, and for 18 years she lived in a basement of her parents' home at Joliet, Ill., where she was discovered by health officers. The girl could neither talk, read or walk. The parents, foreigners, kept her secluded because they thought that the best way to protect her.

Since the operation, two months ago, the girl has shown improvement in mind and body and hospital authorities are now faced with the problem of educating her.

DEMAND CURTAINS FOR WAX FIGURES

Disrobing of Models In Store Windows Draws Large Crowds of Men, Los Angeles Women Declare.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 17.—It looks like "curtains" for the bold, bad women of wax.

Authorities are pondering over a request by a delegation of local women moralists, who demand that wax figures of women in display windows of downtown stores be dressed and undressed behind drawn curtains.

Crowds of men, sometimes number 200, say these women, gather and watch while the garments are removed from the mannikins—or wom-

Frequently, it is charged, the models are entirely denuded of gowns, corsets—well, everything.
