PREDICTS FUTURE FOR ELECTRIC CAR

Current Has No Chance As Motive Power For Airplanes, However, Declares Charles P. Steinmetz.

SCHNECTADY, N. Y., Feb. 18.—Water and highway transportation, as well as railways, may depend upon electricity for motive power because of its greater economy and efficiency, according to Dr. Charles P. Steinmetz, the "wizard of electricity."

The famous inventor called attention, in an interview with the United Press, to the success of the electric drive on American warships and the fact that this method of propulsion is being extended to merchant craft. As regards automobiles, he said:

"When the gasoline engine was first used for automobiles, people protested they would never come into general use because the fuel was not readily obtainable. This difficulty was overcome by the simple process of producing more gasoline and establishing supplies in every part of the country. The use of electric automobiles for touring will grow in just the ratio that facilities for recharging storage batteries are extended."

The use of electric engines for airplanes will never become feasible because of the prohibitive weight of the batteries, considering their power as compared with the power of gasoline engines of corresponding weight, he said.

Dr. Steinmetz declared that water power could never completely replace coal and petroleum products for generating electricity, saying that "if every drop of rain which falls in the United States in a year could be transmitted directly in power it could not replace our present coal consumption." He similarly characterized the use of the sun's rays, tides and the wind for solution of our power problems under present conditions as "dreams," contending that the expense of harnessing these elements would far outweigh the value of the power derived.

Communication with other planets by radio was said by Dr. Steinmetz to be "possible, but not probable." He said a plant of only 100,000 horsepower might be sufficient to send an electric wave to Mars, but that the establishment of actual communication would depend not only upon the Martians having instruments to record the waves, but on there being Martians.

The Kiss in Religion.

Gradually the custom spread beyond the walls of the church and eventually people sought reconciliation and peace with a kiss.

History of Pawnbroking.
