this method of apportionment is still as nearly fair and exact as may be written in any legislative act, as the number of motor vehicle licenses in each state fairly reflects the wealth, population and total road mileage within the state. If this factor is used in apportioning funds it is easy and inexpensive to ascertain the

size of the factor by merely getting a certificate from the official having charge of the motor vehicle department.

According to data gathered by Senator Stanfield, the total area of each of the public land states, and the area of the forest reserves in each is as follows:
