FOUND BEND PEOPLE EVERYWHERE, SAYS WIEST, AFTER TOUR

(Continued from Page 1.)

country in a leisurely fashion, stopping for a day or longer at a number of towns in each state visited. Longer stops were made with friends at Chicago, Warren, Pa., where they stayed a month; Baltimore, Washington, D. C. Spring Grove, Pa., Leke Worth, Fla., Mobile, Ala., Fort Worth and El Paso, Tex., Phoenix, Ariz., and five weeks at Long Beach, Cal. Thorough tours were made of New York city and San Francisco and surrounding points of interest.

Leaving Bend in June, Mr. and Mrs. Wiest went to Pendleton by way of Wasco, thence across the Blue mountains to La Grande and Baker City, through Huntington into Idaho, where they passed through Weiser, Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello and Idaho Falls. From there they went to Yellowstone, Wyo., touring the national park.

Driving through the Shoshone canyon, they passed through Thermopolis, Lost Cabin, Caspar, Douglas, Wyo., and Edgemont, Mont. They stopped for two weeks at the hot springs at Thermopolis.

In South Dakota they visited Hot Springs, Wind Cave, Custer City, Pierre and Watertown. From there they went to Granite Falls, Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minn., through Hudson, Wis., visiting Font du Lac and Oshkosh before arriving at Chicago.

After leaving Chicago they saw Kalamazoo, Jackson, Ann Arbor and Monroe, Mich., Toledo and Cleveland, Ohio. In upper New York they visited Buffalo and Niagara Falls, then proceeding to Jamestown and to Warren, Pa. Before reaching New York city they passed through Salamanca, Olean, Walkers Glen, Ithaca, Schenectady, Albany and Poughkeepsie.

In southeastern Pennsylvania they took time to explore the entire anthracite coal and manufacturing region between the Susquehanna and Delaware rivers. Previous to this Newark and Trenton, N. J., were visited. Proceeding south, they took in Baltimore, Mount Vernon, the battlefields of Gettysburg and Antietam and the Shenandoah valley. In West Virginia they visited the Louray canyon and Natural bridge, crossed the Blue mountains to Martinsville, Va., and visited Greensbury and Charlotte, N. C., and Greenville, S. C.

A side trip was made to Palm Beach, Fla., other towns visited in that state being Jacksonville, Daytona, Tallahassee and Pensacola. They crossed Mobile bay to Mobile and went north to Greenwood, Miss., and through Little Rock and Hot Springs, Ark. Fort Worth and El Paso, Tex., and Tucson and Phoenix, Ariz., were visited on the trip west.

Passing through the Imperial valley, they came north through Redlands, San Bernardino, Pasadena, Los Angeles, Long Beach, up the coast to Hollywood, Santa Barbara, San Jose and San Francisco.

From there into Oregon they passed Venice, Redding, Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass, Roseburg, Eugene, Salem, Portland, east along the Columbia River highway and through The Dalles and Wasco, home to Bend.

They carried with them a complete camping outfit, but stayed at hotels as much of the time as they camped. Some difficult pieces of road were negotiated, says Mr. Wiest, but there were practically no exciting events on the trip.

Furniture Cleaner.
 Home-made furniture cleaner can be made by adding one tablespoonful of turpentine and three tablespoonfuls of linseed or lemon oil to one quart of boiling water. When cool enough to be comfortable to the hand, use as a wash water on all furniture except white enamel. Soft cheesecloth for wash cloth and a dry piece for a soft wiping cloth will give the good polish of clean wood. There being no varnish in the mixture, the furniture will not be sticky from this cleaner.
