**MOTHER OF LOCAL ENGINEER IS DEAD**

**Mrs. J. E. Gould, Native of Ohio—Living Here With Son, Is Victim of Paralytic Stroke.**

Mrs. J. E. Gould, mother of Robert B. Gould, city engineer, died yesterday afternoon at his home, 333 Drake road, after a stroke of paralysis. She was taken ill Saturday.

Mrs. Gould, whose maiden name was Louise Beam, was born at Mt. Vernon, Ohio, in April, 1852. She married J. E. Gould on December 20, 1876, at Delaware, Ohio. They made their home there for several years, and it was there that the two children, Robert B. Gould and a daughter, now Mrs. Charles Fine of Calgary, Alberta, were born.

In 1884 the family moved to Minneapolis, where they lived until Mr. Gould's death in 1903. Mrs. Gould went to Seattle, where she lived with Mrs. Fine until last year, when she came to Bend to live with her son. She formed a wide acquaintance while here. She also leaves a sister, Mrs. Walter K. Patrick, in Minneapolis. She was a lifelong member of the Episcopal church.

The body will be shipped tonight to Minneapolis, to be laid to rest in Lakewood cemetery beside that of her husband. Mr. Gould is unable to go to Minneapolis, but Mrs. Fine and other relatives will be there for the funeral. No services will be held here.

**Expect To Serve 300 Tomorrow Night—Chefs Assigned To Duty—No Ladies Allowed In Kitchen.**

The chefs assigned to kitchen duty are S. W. Moore, S. O. Watkins, Walter Jacobs, J. O. Gibson, J. W. Morrison and C. T. Terrill. Charles G. Wilson will be head waiter, Paul Reynolds chief flunkiey, George Hoover, general roustabout. These, with plenty of masculine assistance, will put the thing over.
