CONGRESS TOLD ALASKA'S NEED

and localized management of the forests by a resident authority," McPherson declared. "This authority should be empowered to encourage the establishment of the pulp wood industry by reasonable regulations."

In striking contrast to the development of this industry in Alaska, McPherson produced statistics indicating that the paper pulp manufacture of British Columbia, which was started in 1912, is now the industry of second importance in the province. His figures showed that British Columbia in 1918 sold more than \$10,000,000 worth of paper to American newspapers, and that the capital for the development of the industry came mostly from American sources. The importation of pulp wood in 1919 was valued at an excess of \$36,000,000, and more than two-thirds of the imports came from Canada. He declared the fact is that the United States has made it impossible to develop a pulp wood industry in Alaska and forced American capital to go to Canada, and has at the same time made the nation dependent upon other countries for the equivalent of two-thirds of the news print used by American newspapers.

Salmon Industry Hit.

While the government has failed to use the timber resources of Alaska, thereby contributing to its destruction by dry-rot, it has allowed another essential resource to become threatened with depletion through over-development. McPherson yielded figures showing that the salmon fisheries of Alaska have produced more than \$306,000,000, and that the supply of this valuable food is rapidly becoming exhausted because of the lack of a law to protect the industry. McPherson said that salmon, once the poor man's food in Scotland and on the eastern shores of the United States, had become a delicacy of the rich, because the streams were over-fished. He declared that the same fate inevitably will befall the Alaska salmon fisheries unless immediate steps are taken to regulate and conserve the supply.

"The fish strive to ascend the streams to their spawning grounds," he said, "but too few escape the nets and traps. A contributing factor to the over-fishing is the class of labor employed. Contract labor of the lowest class is annually taken north on the cannery boats. These men have no interest whatever in protecting the food resources of the nation. Almost half of them are of other races than white men. They take what fish they can catch, destroy what they do not need, and then

leave the territory, to return the next year. "Conflict in the powers vested in the United States bureau of fisheries and the Alaska legislature has resulted in retarding the industry on one hand and failed to serve the people of Alaska, in whom the fisheries should be vested, on the other. Immediate and comprehensive measures of conservation, an adequate policy of control and inducements to a resident fishing population are among the remedial measures asked."

marketing stocks or bonds. It was frankly admitted that oil stock dealers now operating in Bend were the target for the proposed legislation. In the face of the argument that no city law could supplement the provisions of the "blue sky" statute, no definite action was taken.

No part of the expense of graveling Tumalo avenue, an improvement which has been carried on recently by residents along that thoroughfare, will be borne by the city, the council decided. A bill for \$58.13 for the gravel used was unanimously disallowed on the grounds that the work had never been authorized by the council. All work on the street had been donated by the property holders, a communication from Carl A. Johnson, representing the Tumalo avenue residents, stated.

May Increase Paving

A written recommendation from the president of the Western Willite Road Construction Co., for hard surfacing on Minnesota avenue from the alley east of Bond to Lava road, was viewed favorably by the council, only C. J. Leverett voting against the motion to refer to the streets committee. Sewers must be installed before paving and Mr. Reed offered to do this work and to take city bonds at par in payment for sewer as well as for surfacing.

The council had previously gone on record as opposed to the paving of Riverside drive for a distance of one block, which had been asked in order that Congress, already listed for paving, and Franklin, which is in the first section of the city to be hard surfaced, might be connected. The stand taken in regard to Riverside drive was that the council did not wish to have any new work undertaken until the value of the paving material has been proved.

Innes Finds Lost Property.

Councilman Innes gained a reputation as a tracer of lost property when he reported that the long missing municipal grader is near the Vandervort ranch on the La Pine road. He mentioned also that a boiler belonging to the city, worth about \$500, is in Red Rock canyon.

H. E. Nordeen, of the health committee, stated that the city disposal plant is in deplorable condition and a veritable stench in the nostrils of neighboring ranchers. Further action was left to the committee.

Councilman Gilbert, irritated by news reports of the previous council session, angrily criticized the accuracy of the news account of his statements. He neglected to specify the points of alleged error on which he based his criticism.

The council passed the ordinance introduced at the last session requiring permits for felling trees or blasting.

Requests from the Fourth of July

celebration committee that concession fees go into the celebration fund were referred to the police committee.
