

# REDMOND WINS IN SLOW GAME

## VICTORY 15 TO 7 GAINED ON BEND FIELD—HITS AND ERRORS MANY—MITCHELL PROVES SLUGGER.

In a raggedly played game on the depot grounds, Redmond defeated the Shevlin-Hixon team by a score of 15 to 7. Errors on both sides contributed largely to the scoring, although 16 hits were chalked up by the visitors.

Redmond took a five-run lead in the first two innings, but Bend came back strong, so that at the end of the fifth Redmond had only a margin of two points. In the sixth and ninth, however, the visitors pounded in three and four runs. Bend's only good inning was the fifth, when four hits produced as many tallies.

The Bend team showed flashes of form in the field, but bad novices and errors in judgment proved costly. At the bat they were likewise unlucky, at least one batting rally being stopped by a double play. "Slim" Simpson, a new man in center field, fielded a clean game and secured two hits. Steidl and Slate also each hit twice safely.

Mitchell of Redmond was the slugger of the day, getting four base knocks, the first for three bases. Tetherow hit three times and pitched nice ball for three innings. The lineup:

tracks, factories, and many residences will be flooded if the stream continues to rise.

### REFUGEES CARED FOR

COLORADO SPRINGS June 6. — Repair work on bridges and tracks of the Denver & Rio Grande are progressing rapidly. It is expected to handle relief trains, first to cross the devastated area, carrying nurses, doctors and medical equipment.

The first rolling stock of any kind to reach Pueblo was a Crescent Mining Co. flanged truck, carrying Governor Shoup, Colonel Mamerock and various newspaper men. There will be limited passenger train service in 48 hours, it is predicted.

Danger of further flood is negligible.

Governor Shoup told the United Press that "martial law in Pueblo will be maintained indefinitely until the situation is controlled. Little looting is reported. Restoration of the water system is the first thing. There is no apparent shortage of food. Refugees of the flood district are well cared for."
