**WORKMANSHIP IN PAVING PRAISED**

**Presence of Curbing Will Protect**  
Beitler Surfacing, Believes State Highway Engineer Nunn.

Praise for the excellence of the paving job now being done in Bend was voiced by Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer, while here yesterday afternoon. "The workmanship is of a very high order," Mr. Nunn said, "and with the extremely careful preparation being given the cinder and stone base, the city should get reasonable satisfaction from the paving. The pavement itself is a compromise between the Topeka mixture type and a sheet asphalt. This makes a very hard and brittle pavement, but, with the edges protected by curbs, as in the city, and with the kind of base being given, it will probably make no difference. On a highway, without the curb protection, the tendency would be to break off at the edges."

Mr. Nunn asked the price being paid for the work and, on being told, said that \$1.50 for the pavement seemed fair, but that 25 cents for the grading seemed high, compared with the price of 10 cents paid by the state for the same kind of work. For the character of the work, Mr. Nunn had nothing but praise.

**D. O. K. K. TEAM TO COME THIS SUMMER**
