County School Superintendent J. Alton Thompson has just had the satisfaction of seeing one of the forms prepared by him for use in county school work adopted, practically without change, by the state superintendent's office. The form consists of directions to the district clerks for the preparation of the annual school

budget. A representative of the state superintendent's office was in Bend recently and, seeing the form in Mr. Thompson's office, took a copy for a sample. This has now been reprinted and is being sent out from Salem with the new budget law blanks.
