**DEER NOT AFRAID IN SUMMER SEASON**

Do Not Seen Within Two Miles of Town of Sisters By Forest Official On Grazing Survey.

Apparently realizing that they are safe during the summer months, deer are venturing close to the haunts of men, reports Grazing Examiner Jack Horton, just returned from a grazing survey of the country tributary to Warm Springs, Prineville, Redmond, and Madras. Only two miles from Sisters Horton saw a young doe which waited until the forest official's car was almost to her before scampering away into the pines.

Horton noted a novel method of road maintenance in Crook county between Prineville and Redmond. Gasoline pumps are drawing water from irrigation ditches, and the water is being sprayed on the highway preventing the usual condition of Central Oregon roads during the dry season.

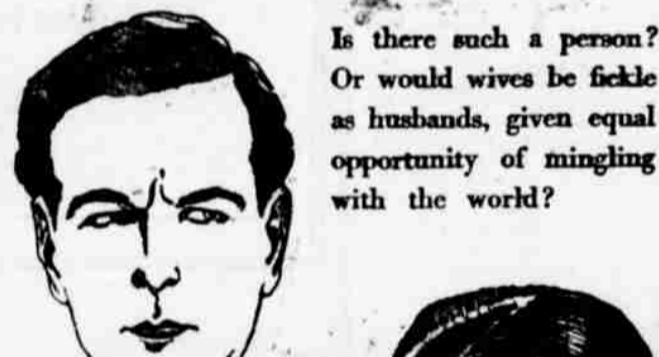
