Miss Comegys spoke yesterday on "How to select a Becoming Hat," discussing the general contour of face and figure in relation to shapes of hats that should not be worn. Rules for color selection were also given. Posters illustrating the points made were exhibited.

The making of a summer hat made of used material was taken up and demonstrated, the plans explained and the material cut, and after a few more stitches are taken an attractive crepe de chine hat will be the property of Mrs. L. R. Kelly, who furnished the materials. Miss Comegys also helped others in the class in planning and cutting materials.

Several groups of women present arranged dates with Miss Comegys for help along the same lines.
