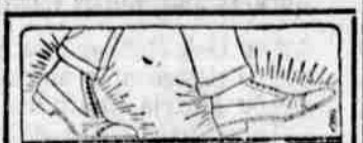
FORMER CAPTIVES NEAR RUSS BORDER
