A number of traveling men also had their cars out of the building for various reasons.

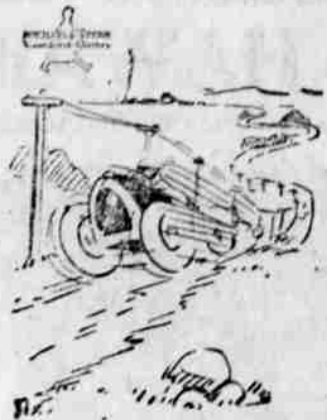

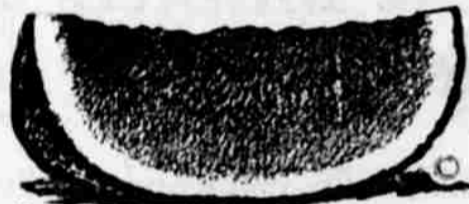
