BUREAU OF AID TO GROWERS OF SPUDS

BUHL, Idaho, Aug. 13.—A temporary field station of the bureau of markets and crop estimates, United States department of agriculture, which was opened at Caldwell last

week, is according potato growers considerable assistance in marketing their crops, according to a survey of the country in this vicinity.

Homer A. Harris is in charge of the work and has charge of distributing market reports on loadings, shipments, and prices at shipping points and in the principal distributing markets.

The office at Caldwell will be continued, with daily service, until the middle of September, when the headquarters will be transferred to Idaho Falls.
