of Portland's responsibility to the rest of the state, declaring that if Portland does not do her part in aiding the development of all Oregon, she is failing in her trust. George Rauch spoke on cooperation. H. C. Hodgkin on the Oregon Associated Industries, and R. W. Neighbor on what Central Oregon has to offer to the tourist and sportsman.

R. S. Hamilton, head of the Commercial club, presided introducing the toastmasters, A. G. Clark, former Ad club president, for Bend, and Frank Tebbetts, leader of the caravan, for Portland. An Ad club roll call introduced the visitors to their hosts.

drive to Bend, he declared. The "camp bum" would be avoided in this way, he said, referring to people who work in town and camp to avoid paying rent. Walter Coombs and T. H. Foley,

also members of the committee, stated that they concurred in the report, inasmuch as they know of no equal site available near the city. Mr. Foley said that while electric lights could not be provided, he had found that campers do not want them. All other conveniences could be arranged, he thought.

A. G. Clark said that a camp such as could be built there would hold the tourists for a week or more. J. B. Sparks thought some revenue would be lost by having it so far from town. Claude Smith said the camp would become a headquarters for side trips into the mountains, and would mean greater revenue for that reason. The creek is the greatest asset, he said.

Park Possibilities Seen.

Mr. McPherson spoke again, declaring that the desired conveniences, lights, electric cookers and piped water, could not be supplied. He said the women in the camping parties would prefer less scenery and more convenience. J. A. Eastes thought no action should be taken on the report until further consideration was given it. Mr. Sawyer suggested that the opponents be placed on a committee, to find a better site and arrange next Wednesday's luncheon there.

On Mr. Foley's motion, the committee was discharged, its report filed, and a new committee authorized.

The luncheon was of sandwiches, pie and coffee, and was held on a grassy plot near the road and the creek, where the possibilities of the park as a camp ground could be easily seen.
