La Roque, so after missing the train on which she had planned to run away yesterday, and walking for several miles down the track, she at last decided to return and hide herself in the city.

Accordingly she went to the Hotel Cory and registered under the name of "Hazel Swift." County officers wired to Madras to have the train searched. Learning that she was not aboard, the Bend police looked for the girl here, but the step-father was the first to find her, guided by the misspelled name. She was taken back to her home. This is the second time the girl has attempted to run away.
