FOUR HOLDUPS NET ROBBERS \$33,000 TOTAL

MASTER THIEVES ARE HELD TO BLAME

CAR ROBBERY BIGGEST

Bank Messenger Relieved of \$17,000 Cash By Armed Men In Crowd—State Bank Is Looted of \$10,000 By Band of Five

PORTLAND, Oct. 10.—Four master holdups occurred throughout the United States today, according to dispatches gathered by the United Press.

In Los Angeles the yeggmen used mats, and wet clothing to muffle the explosion when they robbed the safe of the Victor Hugo Cafe of over \$3,000 cash.

In St. Louis two armed bandits robbed Robert Hardman, bank messenger, on a crowded street car, and escaped with a safe containing \$7,000 cash and \$60,000 in non-negotiable checks.

In Dwyer, Ind., five men robbed the Dwyer State bank of \$6,000 cash, and \$4,000 in Liberty Bonds, and escaped.

LOVE TRIANGLE MAY BE MURDER MOTIVE

Portland Movie Actress Held In Jail As Result of Wild Party Preceding Al Stein's Death.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10.—A peculiar love triangle is being investigated for the motive resulting in the possible murder of Al Stein, motion picture director.

Mildred Bellwin, Portland, Oregon actress is held in jail with her chum, Jean Munroe, as the result of an alleged "wild party" in Stein's apartment.

FIERCE LOOKING INSECT ODDITY BIGGEST SAND CRICKET SENT TO O. A. C.—WANT SPECIMEN INTACT

Classified by experts at the Oregon Agricultural college, the insect oddity with an oversized head, a striped body, and long bleached out legs, is identified at the college as a sand cricket, and is declared to be the largest specimen ever received there.

"This part of the immemorializing is to be performed here, as Prof. Fulton says the specimen is too big to be enthroned on his stick pin with viscera intact.

SEATTLE, Oct. 10.—Believed to be the bandit who robbed a mail train near Sacramento last May, J. Haanstra, overseas war veteran, is held in the county jail here while Postoffice Inspector John White prepares charges connecting him with the theft of \$150,000 in bonds.

CONFERENCE AT CRITICAL POINT

HOOVER INSISTS ON RAIL RATE REDUCTIONS—LABOR AND CAPITAL ACCUSE ONE ANOTHER—LARGO MAY BOLT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—The national unemployment conference, reconvening after a 10 day recess, admittedly entered its "critical period" delegates assembled today.

Herbert Hoover, guiding the conference, insists that only railroad rate reductions can relieve business depression. Representatives of capital insist that labor must accept lower wages; organized labor insists capital must eschew profiteering and slash prices.

YANKS BREAK SUNDAY'S TIE IN 5TH GAME

BATTLE IS HARDEST OF SERIES

SCORES COME EARLY

Giants Hit Hoyt For 10 Safe Oaes, But Are Able To Score But Once—American Leaguers Hit Nehf Six Times, And Score Three.

POLO GROUNDS, New York City, Oct. 10.—Miller Huggins' hungry Yanks made it three to two today, breaking Sunday's tie, when they got to Art Nehf, McGraw's young white hope, for six hits and three runs here in the fifth game of the world series.

The Giants drew first blood in the first inning when Burns was safe on an error, although forced at second by Bancroft. Frisch singled, Young walked and Kelly singled, scoring Bancroft.

The Yanks did their work in the third and fourth innings. In the third McNally walked and Schlang doubled, McNally scoring when Miller flied to Meusel.

Both Hoyt and Nehf pitched great ball and only once was Hoyt in danger, in the first inning, when Manager Huggins sent Quinn to warm up. But the Giants' rally netted only one tally, so Hoyt stayed, to hold the Nationals' runless for the other eight frames.

About 25,000 fans saw the game.
