

DIATOMITE COMPANY DEVELOPING POWER

Plant Near Lower Bridge Will Have 454 Horsepower Capacity, Engineer's Report Announces.

That the Western Diatomite Company is constructing a power plant on the Deschutes river near Lower Bridge for the development of 454 horsepower to be used in connection with their diatomite quarries in this county, is the statement made by Percy A. Cupper, state engineer, in his quarterly report.

During the months of July, August, and September, the state engineer issued 109 permits to appropriate water which cover the irrigation of 3832 acres of land, the development of 490 horsepower, the use of water for municipal, domestic, mining, fluming and other purposes. The estimated cost of the construction work contemplated by the appropriations amounts to approximately \$103,000.00. During this period, permits were issued for the construction of seven reservoirs for the storage of 720 acre feet of water at an estimated cost of approximately \$12,000.00.
